

Charity Reorganisation – Summary of Application

Type of Scheme

Aberdeen Endowments Trust (SC010507) (“the charity”) has applied to the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR) for approval of a reorganisation scheme for a transfer of the property of the charity (after satisfaction of liabilities) to another charity under section 42(3)(b) of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 (the 2005 Act).

The trustees propose to transfer the assets of the charity to a charitable company Aberdeen Education Trust (SC054993). Aberdeen Education Trust has the following charitable purposes:

1. the advancement of education for the benefit of those belonging to Aberdeen; and
2. the advancement of arts, heritage, culture or science for the benefit of those belonging to Aberdeen

Background to the charity

The charity was first established in 1909 under the Robert Gordon’s Technical College and Aberdeen Endowments Trust Order Confirmation Act 1909 and was subsequently constituted as a governing body under the Schemes of 1923, 1934 and 1958. The 1958 Scheme was amended by Schemes of 1972, 1977 and 1981 and is currently governed by The City of Aberdeen Educational Endowments Scheme 1985, as amended (“the 1985 Scheme”). The charity holds assets which are valued at £50million.

The 1985 Scheme is a joint constitution for the charity and one of its principal beneficiaries, Robert Gordon’s College (“RGC”) (SC000123); as well as setting out the relationship between the charity, RGC and Aberdeen City Council (formerly Grampian Regional Council).

The charity is governed by a board of trustees (“the trustees”)

The 1985 Scheme does not contain a standalone clause setting out the charitable purposes for which the charity is established. The following sections set out the purposes and activities of the charity:

- Part IV (as amended) – subsections 27, 28, 29, 31 to 50
- Third Schedule (as amended)

The full 1985 Scheme is appended to this summary.

In general, the charity is established to pay certain bursaries and awards (as prescribed in the 1985 Scheme) from the free income of the charity, with any residue of free income being payable to RGC.

The principal bursaries and awards are:

RGC Bursaries

These are payments to RGC to provide free education to pupils whose financial circumstances would otherwise prohibit access to RGC, with awards used to settle school fees.

RGC Grants/monetary allowances

These are paid to recipients of the RGC Bursaries if the charity's trustees determine additional financial assistance is required for the pupil to take up a place at RGC. The allowance can be used to purchase an iPad for use for lessons and homework, school uniform, school trips and other costs associated with attendance.

RGC School Maintenance Fund

Applied to assist in educating the recipients of the RGC Bursaries, and in maintaining and managing RGC's day school.

Secondary School Bursaries (SSB)

These are awarded to parents of pupils at secondary schools in the former Grampian Region as financial support for parents of pupils at state funded, grant aided or independent schools in that region, where the household financial circumstances are likely to hinder the education of children. The budget for SSB awards is not currently able to be fully met and, at present, these awards assist with the purchase of school supplies.

Plan Expenditure

These are grants awarded to support education.

Reasons for reorganisation

The trustees consider that the 1985 Scheme is inflexible and places the charity under certain financial constraints which have restricted its efficiency and operations. They have set out the following specific issues and reasons for seeking approval of a reorganisation scheme:

- The 1985 Scheme is outdated, overly complex and difficult to navigate.
- The 1985 Scheme does not contain a clear statement of charitable purposes and is difficult to interpret and apply in practice, giving rise to uncertainty in the administration of the charity, including the operation of bursary limits.
- The charity has experienced longstanding structural weaknesses which have been recognised by successive Boards but attempts to address them in the constraints of the 1985 Scheme have been unsuccessful.
- The current constitutional arrangements are rigid and inflexible, limiting the trustees' ability to respond to changing circumstances.
- The joint constitutional structure creates governance and operational difficulties, including challenges relating to conflicts of interest and relationships between the parties involved.
- The legal form of the charity as an endowment fund is not readily understood by third parties and creates operational and administrative challenges.
- Restrictions on the use of funds, including the requirement to distribute income rather than capital and income, create operational and financial pressures and constrain the charity's ability to manage its affairs effectively.

- The charity faces significant operational and financial challenges, including an ongoing structural deficit and pressures arising from its current funding commitments.
- The current structure has contributed to difficulties in managing awards and commitments in a financially sustainable manner.
- Governance and financial arrangements have become increasingly difficult to operate in light of changes in economic and social conditions since the Scheme was established.
- The assets held by the charity include farm estate assets for which the charity is a landlord over the tenancies under the Agricultural Holdings (Scotland) Act 1991. In order to dispose of these assets, for the purpose of reinvestment, the charity is often required to “buy-out” the tenants. Due to the accounting policy treatment of buy-outs, compensation payments must be treated as revenue expenses and this further reduces the income available for payment of bursaries and awards in terms of the 1985 Scheme.
- The trustees wish to take steps to enhance the income generated, including a plan to rebalance assets between farm estate assets and other investments, to significantly increase income over the medium term. They are of the view that a move to a more flexible structure in which grants can be made from capital and income, something that is not permissible under the 1985 Scheme, would more readily allow disposal of these ‘locked’ assets without the significant impact on income and, in turn, grant giving, whilst allowing it to reduce its current deficit and to provide sustainable benefit to its beneficiaries.

Reorganisation condition

The trustees consider that the reorganisation condition relevant to their situation is that some, or all, of the purposes of the charity have ceased in any other way to provide a suitable and effective method of using its property, having regard to the spirit of its constitution (Section 42(2)(a)(iv))

The trustees suggest that the condition is met for the following reasons:

- Despite the significant value of the charity's assets, the charity is no longer able to deliver benefit in the manner intended. In particular, the trustees note that no new awards for RGC Bursaries have been made for the last three years and the funds available have been insufficient to meet the budgets set out for the other bursary and award recipients named in the 1985 Scheme.
- For the last five years there has been no residue of free income payable to RGC after the charity meets all costs and grant commitments.
- While the accounts continue to show support being provided to beneficiaries, in reality, the support reported largely reflects historic commitments rather than new awards. The trustees advise this is due to accounting policy and the treatment of accruals, driven by the updated Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) and the approach taken by the charity's auditors.
- Due to what the trustees describe as a structural deficit, the charity is now faced with a halt in the delivery of new support. They have explained that, in addition to not currently being able to make new awards, based on assessments, a further period without new awards may be required before the deficit can be reduced and the charity's books are brought back in to balance. They further state that, when awards do resume, the charity will not be in a position to support the same number of beneficiaries as it has done in the past to avoid the same issue of deficits arising going forward.
- The level of benefit the charity can provide is limited as a result of the restriction in the 1985 Scheme on only using the free income of the charity.
- The annual budget limits, in the 1985 Scheme, are not fit for purpose. The RGC Bursaries current limit of a payment to RGC of £22,000 bears no resemblance to the current level of RGC school fees. Similarly, the budget limit for the Secondary School Bursaries does not reflect the current demand for this type of assistance. It is estimated that the charity is managing to meet only 10% of SSB demand.



The trustees therefore consider that the charity's current purposes no longer provide a suitable and effective method of applying the charity's substantial assets for charitable benefit, having regard to the spirit of the constitution.

Reorganisation outcome

The trustees consider that the proposed reorganisation scheme will enable the resources of the charity to be applied to better effect for charitable purposes consistently with the spirit of its constitution, having regard to changes in social and economic conditions since it was constituted (section 40(1)(b)(i))

The trustees have provided the following reasons why they consider that the reorganisation scheme will result in the above outcome being met:

- The 1985 Scheme, which is now 41 years old, applies set levels of payments which are in the current economic background significantly out-dated and out of line with the present much higher costs of education and do not reflect economic reality or social need.
- The proposed reorganisation would mean the assets of the charity could be distributed to beneficiaries using a flexible and adaptable Awards Policy. The trustees consider this would ensure that bursaries and other awards reflect current and future levels of need and so utilise the charity's funds to best effect and greater positive impact. The trustees advise that the Awards Policy of Aberdeen Education Trust adheres to the principles of benefit and support set out in the 1985 Scheme and allows for flexibility to address future changes in society and education cost and provision. The trustees consider this addresses the present structural inadequacies and builds in a future proofing for benefits over the coming decades.
- The 1985 Scheme does not enable the application of capital towards the beneficiaries. The trustees' inability to expend capital and income has contributed to the charity's current deficit and the trustees as a consequence have had to address need through income alone. Because the trustees of Aberdeen Education Trust have the power to expend capital and income, the trustees feel the proposed transfer to this charity would transform the application of benefit, utilising capital growth alongside income to achieve a better out-turn overall.

- Aberdeen Education Trust would also allow for a focus on 'total return' rather than on 'free income' and as such enhance the ability to deliver benefit.
- When the charity was established in 1909, the initial capital contribution made by the former Aberdeen Educational Trust (a trust formed in 1889 under the terms of the Educational Endowments (Scotland) Act 1882, in a scheme of administration of 1888 which amalgamated several older Aberdeen charities) was 51% of the charity's total capital; and that the initial capital contribution made by RGC was 49%.
- Over time, and in recent years, RGC has received the majority of awards made by the charity. However, the charity trustees consider that the significance of RGC beneficiaries compared to the others has been hugely artificially inflated in recent years. The trustees state they wish to bring balance back to the distributions, preserving its relationship with its principal beneficiaries and ensuring that benefit is delivered effectively and sustainably to all beneficiaries
- The trustees advise that the Awards Policy of Aberdeen Education Trust provides that awards will be made from revenue in the following proportions, that are fixed for a period of five years:
 - 70% to RGC
 - 30% to Aberdeen Education Trusts' other beneficiaries

Following the initial five-year period:

- a minimum of 49% of Awards from revenue shall be paid to RGC;
- a minimum of 30% of Awards from revenue shall be paid to Aberdeen Education Trusts' other beneficiaries.

21% of Awards from revenue may be distributed to any of Aberdeen Education Trust's beneficiaries at the discretion of that charity's trustees, and in accordance with its Articles and charitable purposes.

- As well as the Awards that are to be made from revenue (as are summarised above), Aberdeen Education Trust is also empowered in terms of its Articles and Awards Policy to make Awards from capital, as Net

Realised Gains may be allocated to revenue by the trustees and distributed as Awards.

- The trustees advise that having scope to make distributions from capital in this way going forward will unlock an additional source of funds for Awards, allowing the charity's beneficiaries to continue to benefit from Awards that are in the spirit of the existing 1985 Scheme; but with the scope to receive greater benefit than has been possible to date. The trustees advise that it is intended that the charity will make use of Aberdeen Education Trust's powers to distribute capital; and that it is envisaged that this will allow for the overall benefit provided to the charity's principal beneficiaries to increase significantly as a result.
- The trustees considered the above allocation of awards to beneficiaries against the backdrop of the 1985 Scheme; the awards made over time to its beneficiaries, with regard to the initial capital contributions made to the charity upon its establishment; as well as to financial projections, all with a view to ensuring that its beneficiaries continue to benefit in accordance with the spirit of its existing constitution. The trustees advise that the intention of the reorganisation is to ensure that capital is unlocked, and its principal beneficiaries have the scope to receive more benefit than has been possible to date, securing a sustainable future for the charity.

SCHEME

SCHEME UNDER THE EDUCATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 1980 AS AMENDED BY THE EDUCATION (SCOTLAND) ACT 1981, FOR THE FUTURE GOVERNMENT AND MANAGEMENT OF THE ENDOWMENTS IN THE CITY OF ABERDEEN, NAMED IN THE FIRST SCHEDULE TO THIS SCHEME.

Preamble

Whereas in the First Schedule to this Scheme opposite to each serial number in column (1) the endowment named in column (2) is an educational endowment within the meaning of Section 122 of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1980, which was given or bequeathed, or was formed by the amalgamation of the endowments named in column (4) which were given or bequeathed, by the persons named or described in column (5), and is governed and managed under the governing instrument described in column (3):

And whereas it appears to the Court of Session in the exercise of the powers conferred on it by Section 105 of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1980, as amended by the Sixth Schedule to the Education (Scotland) Act, 1981, that, in order to extend the usefulness of the endowments to which this Scheme relates, provision should be made for the future government and management thereof:

Therefore, from and after the date upon which the Court of Session shall approve the Scheme, the said endowments shall be held and administered for the purposes, with the powers, and under the conditions and provisions hereinafter set forth.

PART I

CONSTITUTION OF GOVERNING BODIES

Aberdeen Endowments Trust

1. - (1) For the purpose of executing the functions set forth in Part IV of “The Aberdeen Endowments Trust”, a body which was incorporated by the Order of 1909 as amended by the Order of 1923 and was constituted governing body under the Schemes of 1934 and 1958 for the purpose of executing the functions set forth in Part VI and Part IV of these Schemes respectively, the latter Scheme being amended by the Schemes of 1972, 1977 and 1981, shall be and is hereby continued under the said name as a body corporate with perpetual succession and a common seal, and with power to purchase, acquire, hold and dispose of lands and other property, heritable and moveable, and to sue and be sued, and with all other rights, powers and privileges of a body corporate.

(2) The Endowments Trust shall consist of thirteen elected trustees and not less than two or more than four co-opted trustees, that is to say:-

- (a) three persons to be elected by Grampian Regional Council of whom two shall be members of the Education Committee;
- (b) one person to be elected by the Senatus Academicus of the University of Aberdeen;
- (c) two persons to be elected by the College Governors from their own number;
- (d) two persons to be elected by the Church of Scotland Presbytery of Aberdeen from their own number;
- (e) one person to be elected at a meeting of representatives of the Churches (other than the Church of Scotland) or denominational bodies having duly constituted charges or other regularly appointed places of worship within the City;
- (f) one person to be elected by the Society of Advocates in Aberdeen from their own number;
- (g) one person to be elected by the Convener Court of the Seven Incorporated Trades of Aberdeen from their own number;
- (h) one person to be elected at a meeting of representatives of Trade Unions situated or having branches in the City;
- (i) one person to be elected by the Aberdeen Local Association of the Educational Institute of Scotland from their own number;
- (j) not less than two or more than four persons, whose experience will, in the opinion of the trustees, be of value to them in the exercise of their functions, to be co-opted by the trustees.

Governors of Robert Gordon's College

2. - (1) For the purpose of executing the functions set forth in Part V "The Governors of Robert Gordon's Colleges", a body which was incorporated by the Order of 1909 as amended by the Order of 1923 and was constituted governing body under the Schemes of 1934 and 1958 for the purpose of executing the functions set forth in Part VII and Part V of these Schemes respectively, the latter Scheme being amended by the Schemes of 1972, 1977 and 1981, shall be and is hereby continued under the name of "The Governors of Robert Gordon's College" as a body corporate with perpetual succession and a common seal, and with power to purchase, acquire, hold and dispose of lands and other property, heritable and moveable, and to sue and be sued, and with all other rights, powers and privileges of a body corporate.

(2) The College Governors shall consist of an ex officio governor, fourteen elected governors and not less than four or more than six co-opted governors, as follows, that is to say:-

- (a) The Convener of Grampian Regional Council shall be the ex officio governor.
- (b) The following persons shall be the elected governors, that is to say:-
 - (i) three persons to be elected by Grampian Regional Council of whom two shall be members of the Education Committee of the Council;
 - (ii) two persons to be elected by the Aberdeen Endowments Trust from their own number;
 - (iii) two persons to be elected by the Senatus Academicus of the University of Aberdeen;
 - (iv) two persons to be elected by the Church of Scotland Presbytery of Aberdeen from their own number;
 - (v) two persons to be elected by the Gordonian Association from their own number;
 - (vi) one person to be elected by the Convener Court of the Seven Incorporated Trades of Aberdeen from their own number;
 - (vii) one person to be elected by the Aberdeen Chamber of Commerce from their own number;
 - (viii) one person to be elected at a meeting of representatives of Trade Unions situated or having branches in the City.
- (c) The following persons shall be co-opted governors, that is to say:- not less than four or more than six persons to be co-opted by the College Governors.

Grampian Regional Council

3. - The Grampian Regional Council, as statutory successors of the Corporation of the City of Aberdeen, in accordance with the terms of Section 128 of the Local Government (Scotland) Act, 1973, shall be the governing body for the purposes of executing the functions set forth in Part VI.

Elections

4. - (1) The elections of trustees under paragraph (a) of subsection (2) of Section 1 and of governors under paragraph (b) (i) of subsection (2) of Section 2 shall stand referred to the Education Committee of Grampian Regional Council and the Council shall, before electing the said representatives, receive and consider the report of the said Committee, provided that it shall be in the power of the Council to delegate any or all of their said powers to the said Committee. The business with regard to elections shall be transacted either at ordinary meetings of the Council or of the said Committee or at meetings summoned for the purpose which shall be convened and conducted according to the ordinary rules and practice of the Council or of the said Committee.

(2) Meetings for the election of a trustee under paragraph (e) of subsection (2) of Section 1 shall be convened and conducted by the Director of Law and Administration of Grampian Regional Council according to the ordinary rules and practice of the said Council, and the Churches or denominational bodies having the right to nominate shall be entitled to send such number of representatives to such meetings as may be prescribed by the Council.

(3) Meetings for the election of a trustee under paragraph (h) of subsection (1) of Section 1 and of a governor under paragraph (viii) of subsection (2) of Section 2 shall be convened and conducted by the Director of Law and Administration of Grampian Regional Council according to the ordinary rules and practice of the said Council. Each Trade Union situated or having branches in the City shall be entitled to send two representatives to such meetings to participate in the nomination and election of either a trustee or a governor. A register of Trade Unions situated or having branches in the City shall be maintained and revised by the Director.

Period of Office

5. - (1) The elected trustees and the elected governors shall, subject to the provision of the next following section, hold office for periods of three years from and after the termination of the periods of office of their predecessors.

(2) The co-opted trustees and the co-opted governors shall hold office for such periods not exceeding three years as the trustees and the College Governors may decide when co-opting them.

Resignations, etc.

6. - (1) Any trustee or governor who is in terms of this Scheme elected from the members of a particular body shall be deemed to have vacated office on ceasing to be a member of such body provided that any trustee or governor elected from the members of an education committee shall not cease to be a trustee or governor by reason of the termination of his period of office as a member of the said committee if on the occurrence of the said termination he is appointed to serve for a further period on the said committee.

(2) Any trustee or governor who shall intimate in writing his resignation of office, or shall become bankrupt or incapacitated to act, or shall for the space of one year without leave of absence omit to attend any meeting of the Endowments Trust or of the College Governors or of any committee of either body, as the case may be, shall thereupon be held to have vacated office.

Vacancies

7. - (1) Every vacancy in the office of trustee or governor, whether occasioned by expiry of a normal period of tenure of office, or by death or by any other cause, shall be entered in the Minutes of the Endowments Trust or of the College Governors, as the case may be.

(2) (a) In the case of a vacancy among the elected trustees or among the elected governors, the vacancy shall be intimated by the clerk of Endowments Trust or the College Governors, as the case may be, to the clerk or other appropriate official of the body entitled as aforesaid to elect a successor. In the case of a vacancy caused by the expiry of the normal period of tenure of office as a trustee or governor, the said intimation shall be made not less than one month before the date of the vacancy. In other cases the vacancy shall be intimated as soon as may be after its occurrence. Within three months of the date of the said intimation a successor shall be elected by the body entitled to make such election.

(b) If the body entitled to elect a trustee or governor under the last foregoing paragraph fails to do so within the said period of three months, it shall be in the power of the Endowments Trust or of the College Governors, as the case may be, to appoint a successor, provided that the person appointed shall be a person eligible to be elected by the particular electing body. Any appointment under this paragraph shall be deemed to be an election by the body entitled to make the election.

(c) A trustee or governor elected or appointed in place of a trustee or governor who has died or otherwise vacated office before the end of his normal period of tenure of office as a trustee or governor shall, subject to the provisions of the next following section, hold office only during the unexpired portion of tenure of office of the said trustee or governor.

(3) (a) On the occurrence of a vacancy among the co-opted governors which reduces the number of co-opted governors below four, the College Governors shall co-opt a person to fill the vacancy, and on the occurrence of any other vacancy among the co-opted governors, it shall be in their power to co-opt a person to fill the vacancy, provided in either case that a governor co-opted in place of a governor who has died or otherwise vacated office before the end of his normal period of tenure of office as a governor shall, subject to the provisions of the next following section, hold office only during the unexpired portion of the said governor's period of tenure of office.

(b) The provisions of the foregoing paragraph shall, with the necessary modifications, apply to the trustees and the co-opted trustees as they apply to the College Governors and the co-opted Governors, except that the number of co-opted trustees shall not fall below two.

Re-election, etc.

8. - Any trustee or governor on the expiry of his period of office shall, subject to the provisions of this Scheme, be eligible for election, appointment or co-option, as the case may be, to the office of trustee or governor.

PART II

FINANCIAL ARRANGEMENTS

Endowments Trust – Vesting and transfer of funds

9. - (1) The property, rights and interests vested in the Endowments Trust immediately prior to the date of this Scheme shall remain vested in the Endowments Trust. The said property, rights and interests, together with the value of the mortifications hereinafter transferred to the Endowments Trust, along with the annual sums to be paid to the Endowments Trust under this Scheme, shall be held, administered and applied by the Endowments Trust exclusively in accordance with the conditions and provisions of this Scheme.

(2) The properties described in column (3) of the Second Schedule being the properties constituting the mortifications named in column (2) of the said Schedule and which were previously vested in the former Corporation of the City of Aberdeen shall, on the payment of £129,112.00 by the City of Aberdeen District Council to the Endowments Trust, become vested in the District Council without the necessity of any new instrument or conveyance.

(3) The District Council shall pay to the Endowments Trust the appropriate proportion of the revenue from the mortifications at the date of transfer, and also interest at the appropriate rate as notified from time to time by the Secretary of State for Scotland on the capital sum of £129,112.00 from 1st April, 1983, until the date of transfer.

(4) The trustees acting under the Trust Disposition by George, James and Alexander Chalmers dated 24th July, 1844, and the Disposition by the said George and Alexander Chalmers dated 31st October, 1845, with Codicil dated 27th October, 1846, all registered in the Sheriff Court Books of Aberdeenshire on 13th July, 1852, shall retain the trust estate vested in them and shall continue to pay each year to the Endowments Trust the sum of £40.00. The sums so paid shall be added to and form part of the income of the Trust.

(5) The Endowments Trust shall continue to receive each year from the Governors' of Robb's Trust acting under the Robb's Trust Scheme, 1934, the sum of £70.00, together with three shares of the residue of the free annual income of the said Trust in accordance with the provisions of subsection (2) and paragraph (b) of subsection (5), both of Section 21 of the said Scheme. The sums so received shall be applied towards the awarding of the John Robb (University) Bursaries under Section 30 of this Scheme.

College Governors – Vesting of funds

10. - The endowments to which this Scheme relates which were vested in the College Governors immediately prior to the date of this Scheme shall remain vested in the College Governors, and shall be held, administered and applied by the College Governors exclusively in accordance with the conditions and provisions of this Scheme.

Accounts of College Governors

11. - The College Governors shall in continuation of their practice prior to the date of this Scheme maintain as separate funds the Secondary School Cash Capital Fund, the General Capital Fund, the MacRobert Hall and Library Capital Fund, and each fund held by them for special purposes. They shall cause a maintenance account to be kept of receipts and payments in connection with the School. The said account shall be known as the School Maintenance Account.

Vesting of funds in Grampian Regional Council

12. - The endowments which were vested in the Corporation of the City of Aberdeen and which have now become vested in the Grampian Regional Council as statutory successors of the Corporation of the City of Aberdeen, shall remain vested in the said Council and shall continue to be held by the Council as separate funds which shall be administered and applied exclusively in accordance with the conditions and provisions of this Scheme. The fund shall be known as the Grampian Regional Council Prize Fund.

General provisions as to transfers

13. - (1) Without prejudice to anything contained in this Part, if the Endowments Trust or the College Governors, as the case may be, think fit to complete a title to any part of the heritable property vested in them by virtue of this Scheme by expending a notarial instrument or notice of title or otherwise, this Scheme shall be deemed to be and may be used as a general disposition or assignment, as the case may be, of such heritable property in favour of the Endowments Trust or the College Governors, as the case may be.

(2) Without prejudice to anything contained in this Part, any person in whose name any part of the moveable property vested in the Endowments Trust, the College Governors or the Grampian Regional Council by this Scheme is registered shall, if so required by the Endowments Trust, the College Governors or the Grampian Regional Council, as the case may be, execute a transfer of the said property in favour of the Endowments Trust, the College Governors or the Grampian Regional Council, as the case may be.

Powers of investment

14. - (1) It shall be in the power of each governing body to retain any investment in which the funds of any of the endowments to which this Scheme relates are invested immediately prior to the date of this Scheme and any investment received by them under Section 22.

(2) In regard to the investment of funds constituted or continued by this Scheme or of additional endowments received in terms of Section 22, the Endowments Trust and the College Governors shall have all powers competent to them under the Common Law of Scotland as corporate bodies.

(3) In particular, but without prejudice to the foregoing powers of investment, the Trustees shall be empowered to enter into contracts of limited co-partnership under the Limited Partnership Act, 1907, but that only for the purpose of setting up limited partnerships to hold agricultural leases on the Trustees' landed estates: and it is specially provided and declared that so long as the Trustees' capital in any one such limited partnership is not more than £1,000.00 they shall

not be personally liable in the event of the capital's being lost as a result of the insolvency of any such limited partnership.

Occasional profits

15. - Any money which arises from the sale of timber or from mines or minerals on the estates of any governing body or from any other source which is temporary or occasional shall be invested by the said governing body and form part of the capital of the endowment vested in them, provided that it shall be in the power of the said governing body to treat not more than two-fifths of any money arising from the sale of timber in any financial year as part of the ordinary revenue of the said year.

Redemption of periodical payments

16. - Where any annual or other periodical payment is made to any governing body under any Deed of Mortification or other Instrument or under this Scheme, it shall be lawful for the said governing body to enter into an agreement with the debtor in the obligation for the redemption of the said payment provided that the sum to be paid to the said governing body shall be sufficient for investment under the powers contained in Section 14 of this Scheme to yield an income equivalent to the said payment.

Capital Expenditure

17. - (1) Where the Endowments Trust are directed or determine to incur capital expenditure they may borrow money or make drafts upon the capital of the Trust.

(2) Where the Endowments Trust borrow money they may issue bonds or other obligations therefor and may mortgage or charge the whole or any part of the property and funds vested in them. Money borrowed shall be repaid by the Endowments Trust within such period not exceeding sixty years from the date of the respective loans as the Endowments Trust consider reasonable having regard to the purpose for which the capital expenditure is required. Such payment shall be made by setting aside annually out of the income of the Trust such sums as will be sufficient to repay such principal sums and interest thereon either by equal yearly or half-yearly instalments of principal or of principal and interest combined or by means of a sinking fund. Unless otherwise specially provided in this Scheme the sums annually set aside shall be chargeable against the sum allotted from the free income of the Trust for the purposes of the section under which the capital expenditure was incurred.

(3) Where the Endowments Trust make a draft upon the capital of the Trust such draft shall be replaced within such period not exceeding sixty years from the date of the draft as the Endowments Trust consider reasonable having regard to the purpose for which the capital expenditure is required. Such replacement shall be made by setting aside annually out of the income of the Trust such sums as will be sufficient to replace the draft by equal yearly instalments. Unless otherwise specially provided in this Scheme the sums annually set aside shall be chargeable against the sum allotted from the free income of the Trust for the purposes of the section under which the capital expenditure was incurred. The Endowments Trust shall likewise charge annually against the sum so allotted, and treat as part of the free income of the Trust, a sum representing interest upon the amount of the draft not replaced at the beginning of each financial year. The rate of such interest shall be the rate for the time being fixed by the Society of Advocates in Aberdeen for loans secured upon first class heritable security.

Borrowing powers for current expenses

18. - If any governing body shall find it necessary in any financial year to make payments chargeable under this Scheme against the annual income of the endowment vested in them in anticipation of the receipt by them of the said income, the said governing body may temporarily use their capital funds for the purpose or may borrow money for the purpose upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon by the said governing body and the lender, provided that any money so used or borrowed shall be repaid before the expiry of the financial year next following the financial year in which the said money was so used or borrowed.

PART III

ADMINISTRATIVE POWERS AND ARRANGEMENTS

Business arrangements of Endowments Trust and College Governors

19. - (1) Notwithstanding anything contained in Section 70, the provisions of this Section shall apply only to the Endowments Trust and the College Governors.

(2) Each governing body shall hold at least three ordinary meetings in the year, at such places and times as they may determine. Notice of every meeting of a governing body shall be delivered or sent by post to each member by the clerk or other proper officer seven days or such other time before the meeting as the said governing body may appoint.

(3) The chairman or any give of the members may for any cause which seems to him or them sufficient require the clerk or other proper officer at any time to summon a special meeting by a notice in writing, delivered or sent by post to each of the members, which shall specify the business to be brought before the meeting, provided that if such meeting be summoned at shorter notice than that required for an ordinary meeting, no resolution or motion carried thereaft shall take effect unless it is voted for by a majority of the whole members then in office or is confirmed by a subsequent meeting of which not less than seven days' notice is given.

(4) At all meetings of the Endowments Trust seven shall be a quorum. At all meetings of the College Governors seven shall be a quorum. Subject to the provisions of the last foregoing subsection all questions shall be determined by a majority of those present. The chairman of any meeting shall have a second or casting vote in addition to a deliberative vote.

(5) It shall be in the power of each governing body to grant leave of absence for any period not exceeding twelve months to a member on his application and on reasonable cause shown.

(6) If at the time appointed for a meeting, a sufficient number of members to form a quorum be not present, or if the business at any meeting be not completed, the members present shall adjourn the meeting to such day or time as they may fix, of which notice shall be given in such manner as each governing body may appoint.

(7) Each governing body shall appoint a chairman from their own number. They may make such rules under Section 23 as they think fit for supplying his place in the case of his absence.

(8) A minute-book shall be kept by each governing body and minutes of all proceedings of the said governing body shall be entered therein, including resolutions authorising writings or deeds to be executed on behalf of the said governing body.

(9) No failure or delay or defect in the election, appointment of co-option of any member, and no vacancy in a governing body, shall prevent the said governing body from acting in the execution of this Scheme, nor shall any act or proceeding of the said governing body or of any committee appointed by them be invalidated or be illegal by reason or in consequence of any such vacancy or of any defect in the election, appointment or co-option of any one or more members, provided that the

number of members entitled to act shall not thereby be reduced below eleven in the case of the Endowments Trust or fifteen in the case of the College Governors.

(10) All deeds and other writings, sealed by the corporate seal and signed by two members and the clerk or other officers of a governing body appointed for the purpose, shall be held to be validly executed on behalf of the said governing body.

(11) Subject to the provisions of Section 54 it shall be in the power of each governing body to appoint such committees of their own number as they think fit, to appoint the convener of each committee, to commit to each committee all such powers and give all such instructions as may appear expedient and to fix the quorum of each committee.

(12) Each governing body may make such arrangements as they think fit for the custody of all deeds and other documents belonging to them, for the deposit of money and for drawing cheques, provided that all cheques shall be signed by at least one member and the clerk or other officer of the said governing body appointed for the purpose. Each governing body may also arrange for the appointment of a clerk, factor and other proper officers to assist them in the conduct of the business of the endowment, at such reasonable salaries or scales of remuneration as they may determine, provided that any officer of a governing body employed as treasurer who is remunerated for his services shall find such caution as the said governing body may prescribe for his duly accounting for his intromissions with the funds of the endowment. No member acting as such clerk, factor or other officer shall be entitled to any remuneration.

Business arrangements of Grampian Regional Council

20. - The business of the Grampian Regional Council under Section 62 and 63 shall stand referred to the Education Committee of the Council, and the Council before exercising their functions under the said Sections shall, unless in their opinion the matter is urgent, receive and consider the report of the said committee with respect to the matter in question, provided that it shall be in the power of the Council to delegate any or all of their said powers to the said committee. The said business may be transacted either at ordinary meetings of the Council or of the said committee or at meetings summoned for the purpose which shall be convened and conducted according to the ordinary rules and practice of the Council or of the said committee.

Administrative powers

21. - Each governing body shall have power to do any of the acts set forth in the Trusts (Scotland) Acts 1921 and 1961 insofar as the said Acts are not at variance with the terms and purposes of this Scheme.

Additional donations, etc.

22. - It shall be in the power of each governing body to receive donations, legacies, annuities, subscriptions and other gifts, heritable or moveable (hereinafter referred to as "additional donations") for the purposes of any of their functions under this Scheme or for purposes connected therewith. Such additional donations shall be used in accordance with the directions of the respective testators or donors. In the absence of any specific direction relating thereto it shall be in the power of the governing body to add any additional donation in whole or in part to the capital of the endowment administered by them or to apply the said additional donation in whole or in part towards defraying expenditure incurred in the exercise of their functions under this Scheme.

Rules

23. - It shall be in the power of each governing body to make such rules as they think fit for the exercise of their functions under this Scheme, provided that the said rules shall not be inconsistent with the provisions of this Scheme as far as applicable to the said governing body.

PART IV

FUNCTIONS OF THE ABERDEEN ENDOWMENTS TRUST

FINANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Expenses of management, etc.

24. - The Endowments Trust shall in each financial year make the following payments from the annual income of the Trust, that is to say:-

- (a) The necessary expenses of the general administration of the Trust, including, unless otherwise specially provided in this Scheme, all necessary expenditure incurred in the maintenance, repair and improvement of land, buildings and other property belonging to the Trust and such reasonable sum as they think proper to meet the outlays of committees and officers visiting and inspecting their estates;
- (b) unless otherwise specially provided in this Scheme, the sinking fund and interest charges upon the debt for the time being of the Trust;
- (c) any other burdens and taxes affecting the Trust.

Retiring allowances for officers

25. - It shall be in the power of the Endowments Trust to make such arrangements as they think fit for retiring allowances to officers of the Endowments Trust and to defray from the free income of the Trust such expenditure incurred in the said arrangements as falls to be met by the Endowments Trust:

Provided that:-

- (i) in the case of a retiring allowance paid from the free income of the Trust, the retiring allowance shall not in any one financial year exceed the following amounts, that is to say:-
 - (a) in the case of an officer with less than twenty five years' service, a sum equal to one-third of the last year's salary of such officer (hereinafter referred to as "pensionable salary");
 - (b) in the case of an officer with twenty five years' service or more, a sum equal to one-half of the pensionable salary of such officer;
- (ii) in the case of a retiring allowance paid from funds not administered by the Endowments Trust, it shall be in the power of the Endowments Trust to supplement the retiring allowance from the free income of the Trust subject to the aggregate of the retiring allowance and the supplement not exceeding one-third of pensionable salary in the case of an officer with less than twenty five years' service and one-half of pensionable salary in the case of an officer with twenty five years' service or more;

(iii) in reckoning the years of service of any such officer, employment with the Endowments Trust and the College Governors shall be taken into account.

(iv) any retiring allowance shall be subject to increases in terms of the Pensions (Increase) Act, 1971, and the Endowments Trust is empowered to meet the cost of increases to former employees who receive pensions from the Grampian Regional Council superannuation fund.

Liquidation of deficit

26. - In the event of the expenditure of the Endowments Trust in any financial year exceeding the income of the Trust, the deficit shall be carried forward to the following financial year and shall be defrayed out of the income of that year.

Reserve Fund

27. - (1) The Endowments Trust shall continue to maintain a Reserve Fund from which they may meet extraordinary expenditure which may be incurred under paragraph (a) of Section 24 in the maintenance, repair and improvement of the property belonging to the Trust.

(2) The Endowments Trust may transfer from the income of the Trust such sums as they may deem fit, provided that the total amount of the Reserve Fund may not at any time exceed the sum of £100,000.00 and that any such transfer would not be contrary to the agreement reached annually under the terms set forth in column (6) of the Third Schedule of the Scheme.

(3) Any income which may be attributable to the Reserve Fund shall be added to the income of the Trust.

FOUNDATIONS, FREE EDUCATION, ETC

School foundations and bursaries

28. - (1) Subject to such deductions as may be necessary to meet expenditure under Section 65, the Endowments Trust shall expend in each financial year from the free income of the Trust sums not exceeding the sums set forth in column (3) of the Third Schedule in paying the respective foundations and bursaries named in column (1) of the said Schedule. The number of foundations and bursaries to be awarded shall be in accordance with the provisions of column (6) of the said Schedule. Each foundation or bursary shall be tenable for not more than six years, unless otherwise stated, in a course of secondary education at the school/s named in column (2) of the said Schedule opposite the name of the said foundation or bursary, and shall be of the annual value set forth in column (4) of the said Schedule. The respective foundations and bursaries shall be awarded to persons conforming to the descriptions given in column (5) of the said Schedule, and shall be held subject to the provisions of this Scheme, provided that the children of parents who are resident abroad but who were ordinarily resident in the City immediately before going abroad shall be deemed to be persons belonging to the City.

(2) Upon each occasion of the award of a Robert Gordon's Foundation or a Robert Gordon's Bursary, the Endowments Trust shall satisfy themselves that the recipients are of sufficient attainment to merit the award of the foundation or bursary. For this purpose, they may require each candidate to undergo such examination as they think fit and shall take into account the results of any examination held, and a report on the candidate's progress from the Head Teacher of the school attended by the candidate during the session in which the application is made.

(3) Upon each occasion of the award of a Secondary School Bursary, the Endowments Trust shall satisfy themselves that each candidate to whom they make an award is of sufficient attainment to merit the bursary. For this purpose, the Endowments Trust may take into consideration the result of any examination undergone by the candidate in the normal course of his or her school curriculum and they may obtain from the Head Teacher of the school attended by the candidate a report on the candidate's progress during the session in which the application is made, including the candidate's progress record or such relevant extracts therefrom as they may deem fit.

(4) If the Endowments Trust is satisfied that there is a case of financial hardship involving the parent or parents of a pupil not being a bursar on the roll of the Secondary School Bursaries for Boys and Girls, it shall be in the power of the trustees to award a bursary to such pupil at any stage between secondary 1 and secondary 4, provided they are satisfied, on consideration of the school record, that the pupil merits the award of the bursary. No bursary shall be awarded under this subsection to a pupil who does not conform to the description set forth in column (5) of the said Schedule opposite to the name of that bursary. Each bursary awarded under this subsection shall be held subject to the conditions under which it would have been held if it had been awarded under subsection (1) of this Section.

(5) If the Endowments Trust is satisfied that, owing to a change of financial circumstances, a person not being a foundationer under this Section who is receiving secondary education at Robert Gordon's College will be unable to continue in attendance at the said College without the help of a foundation, it shall be in their power to award a foundation under this Section to such person, tenable at the said College, provided they are satisfied, on consideration of the school record, that the said person merits the award of a foundation. No foundation shall be awarded under this subsection to a person who does not conform to the description set forth in column (5) of the said Schedule opposite to the name of that foundation. Each foundation awarded under this subsection shall be held subject to the conditions under which it would have been held if it had been awarded under subsection (1) of this Section.

(6) The foregoing subsection shall also apply to Robert Gordon's Bursaries which may be awarded in terms of Section 29.

(7) In the event of any foundation or bursary offered by the Endowments Trust under this Section not being awarded on account of failure to find duly qualified candidates, or of any foundation or bursary lapsing owing to the death of the holder, or his resignation of the foundation or bursary, or his removal from school, or the withdrawal or suspension of the foundation or bursary, it shall be in the power of the Endowments Trust to transfer the balances arising thereby to the Lapsed and Unallocated Foundations and Bursaries Fund, provided that separate accounts shall be kept of balances arising through the failure of the following types of foundation or bursary, that is to say:- Robert Gordon's Foundations restricted to orphans and poor boys; Robert Gordon's Foundations not so restricted; Robert Gordon's Bursaries; Secondary School Bursaries for Boys and Girls.

(8) It shall be in the power of the Endowments Trust, after paying any necessary expenses of management of the Lapsed and Unallocated Foundations and Bursaries Fund, to apply the whole or part of the balances in each of the separate accounts in awarding additional foundations or bursaries under such conditions as the Endowments Trust may prescribe:

Provided that –

(i) none of the balances shall be used for the benefit of persons who do not conform to the description (is so far as set forth in column (5) of the Third Schedule) of the persons for whose benefit the sums composing the said balances were respectively destined;

(ii) each of the said balances shall be used to provide foundations or bursaries at the school at which the lapsed or unallocated foundations or bursaries giving rise to the said balance would have been held.

(9) The sums at the credit of the following Lapsed Funds at the commencement of this Scheme shall be transferred to Benefit Funds and such transferred sums shall be utilised in accordance with Section 31 until they have been exhausted:-

The sums at the credit of the John Robb (School) Bursaries and Aberdeen Secondary School Bursaries Lapsed Funds shall be transferred to the Secondary School Bursaries for Boys and Girls Lapsed Fund which is set up under subsection (7) of this Section.

Payments for free education at Robert Gordon's College

29. - (1) Subject to such deductions as may be necessary to meet expenditure under Section 65, the Endowments Trust shall, subject to the provisions of Section 49, pay in each financial year to the College Governors from the free income of the Trust such sum not exceeding £1,100.00 as may be agreed upon in accordance with the provisions of subsection (3) of this Section. The said sum shall be included by the College Governors in the School Maintenance Account.

(2) In respect of the payments to be made under the last foregoing subsection, the College Governors shall provide free education at the School for not more than 260 boys. The boys shall be the holders of the Robert Gordon's Foundations awarded under the last foregoing Section and such other boys as may be nominated by the Endowments Trust in accordance with the provisions of this subsection. The said other boys shall be known as Robert Gordon's Bursars. Robert Gordon's Bursars shall be nominated from among boys who are already in attendance at the School or are about to be admitted to the School who are orphans or whose parents are in such financial circumstances as to require aid in providing education for their children at the School. In awarding the bursaries, the Endowments Trust shall have regard to the diligence, attainment and promise of the candidates.

(3) The Endowments Trust and the College Governors shall enter into agreements as to the annual sum to be paid to the College Governors, as to the number of Robert Gordon's Bursars to be nominated, as to the methods and conditions of nomination, as to the period and conditions of tenure of Robert Gordon's Bursaries and generally as to any matter arising under this Section.

(4) It shall be in the power of the Endowments Trust to expend a sum not exceeding £400.00 in each financial year in paying grants of such amount as they think expedient to the most necessitous of the Robert Gordon's Bursars.

(5) In the event of the Endowments Trust and the College Governors failing to reach agreement under this Section, the matter shall be referred to a mutually agreed person as arbiter, and the decision of the arbiter shall be final. The expenses of the arbitration as approved by the arbiter shall be defrayed from the sums directed to be paid under this Section to the College Governors.

Miscellaneous purposes

30. - (1) (a) The Endowments Trust shall maintain John Robb (University) Bursaries, which shall be tenable in any Faculty of the University of Aberdeen for such number of years as is necessary to enable the holders to graduate. Each bursary shall be open to persons ordinarily resident in the City, provided that the Endowments Trust shall be hereinafter provided prefer persons ordinarily resident in that part of the City which was formerly the Second Municipal Ward. The annual value of the bursaries shall be £150.00.

(b) Upon each occasion of the award of a bursary the Endowments Trust shall satisfy themselves that the candidate to whom they make the award is of sufficient attainment to merit the bursary. For this purpose, they shall require each candidate to undergo the examination conducted by the Senatus Academicus of the University of Aberdeen for the purpose of awarding competitive entrance bursaries in the Faculty in which he proposes to study. They shall obtain a report of the results of the examination showing whether in the opinion of the Senatus the candidate is of sufficient attainment to merit the bursary, and if more than one candidate has undergone the examination, the order of merit of the candidates.

(c) If among the candidates who are reported to be of sufficient attainment (hereinafter referred to as "qualified candidates"), there is a candidate or are candidates entitled to a preference, the Endowments Trust shall award the bursary to the said candidate or to the most deserving of the said candidates, as the case may be. If no preferred candidate is reported to be of sufficient attainment, the Endowments Trust shall consider the cases of the other candidates, and if among the said candidates there is a qualified candidate or are qualified candidates, the Endowments Trust shall award the bursary to the said candidate or to the most deserving of the said candidates, as the case may be. In the event of there being no qualified candidate for the bursary, no award shall be made, and the Endowments Trust shall offer the bursary for competition in the following year.

(d) It shall be in the power of the Endowments Trust to withhold a bursary from competition for a year, in order to secure that the bursaries to be awarded under this subsection are awarded at suitable intervals.

(2) In each financial year the Endowments Trust shall apply the income from the Dr. A.A. Cormack's Prize Fund for the benefit of a pupil at Aberdeen Grammar School.

(3) (a) The Endowments Trust shall apply in each financial year from the free income of the Trust such sum as may be necessary for payment of the annuity to the heirs male of Alexander McRa of Inverinet in accordance with the last Will and Testament of the said Alexander McRa, Ironmonger in Bristol, dated 8th November, 1763, provided that if on the death of an annuitant the Endowments Trust are required to pay capital transfer tax from the capital of the Trust, they shall make an appropriate reduction in the amount of the annuity payable to the next following annuitant.

(b) In so far as there is any annuity unpaid in terms of Section 3(a), the Endowments Trust shall make such payment when called upon to do so by the annuitant or his successors.

EXPENDITURE UNDER PLANS

Expenditure under plans

31. - (1) Subject to such deductions as may be necessary to meet expenditure under Section 65, the Endowments Trust shall apply in each financial year a sum not exceeding £10,000.00 in conformity with the plan hereinafter prescribed, provided that no expenditure shall be incurred from the plan in relief of expenditure which would in the absence of the endowment ordinarily be incurred from any other fund, and not less than £900.00, £180.00, £120.00 and £100.00 of the said sum shall be so applied as to benefit pupils attending the Aberdeen Grammar School, Harlaw Academy and Hazlehead Academy until the Benefit Funds established under subsection (9) of Section 28 of this Scheme have been exhausted.

(2) From 1985 onwards, the sum of £10,000.00 may be increased in each year by an amount to be determined by the Endowments Trustees. The maximum permissible increase in each year over the sum payable in the preceding year shall be a percentage equal to the percentage increase in the Retail Price Index during the year ended on 31st December immediately preceding the Endowment Trustees' Determination. In determining the increase in any year, the Endowments Trustees shall have regard to the total estimated revenue of the Endowments Trust.

Contents of plans and revision or amendment of plans

32. - (1) The plan shall be in the form prescribed in the Fourth Schedule and shall be completed in accordance with the instructions given in the said Schedule. Expenditure under the plan for the purposes of any Section of this Scheme shall be subject to the conditions set forth in the said Section, to such of the provisions of Sections 66 and 67 as may be applicable, and to such other conditions as may be prescribed by the Endowments Trust, provided that such other conditions shall not be inconsistent with anything in the Scheme.

(2) The Endowments Trust may at any time prepare a revised plan or amend the plan prepared in accordance with the Fourth Schedule.

Post-graduate scholarships

33. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in awarding scholarships for research work or for advanced or special study to persons belonging to the City, who are of high attainment and promise and who have graduated at a University or obtained the diploma of a Central Institution or other appropriate institution, provided that such persons require financial aid to enable them to undertake such research work or advanced or special study. Each candidate shall submit for the approval of the Endowments Trust, a programme of the work or study to be undertaken by him. Each scholarship shall be tenable for one year, and it shall be in the power of the Endowments Trust to extend the period of tenure from year to year on being satisfied with the progress made by the holder of the scholarship. In making awards under this Section, the Endowments Trust shall have regard to the records of the candidates at the Universities, Central Institutions or other institutions attended by them. The annual value of each scholarship shall be such

as the Endowments Trust may fix, having regard to the financial circumstances of the holder (including any other bursaries or grants paid to him), and to the expenses likely to be incurred by him.

Travel scholarships

34. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in awarding travel scholarships to persons belonging to the City, who require financial aid to enable them to travel forth or Scotland to a University, College, Educational Institution or Centre, approved by the Endowments Trust, to stay at or near such University, College, Institution or Centre while undergoing a course of study, to pay any fees which may be charged for such course, and to obtain any necessary books or instruments. In granting such scholarships, the Endowments Trust shall have regard to the diligence, attainment and promise of the applicants. In determining the value of each scholarship, the Endowments Trust shall have regard to the financial circumstances of the applicant (including any other bursaries or grants paid to him), and to the expenses likely to be incurred by him.

Travel grants

35. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in making grants to persons belonging to the City, to enable them to travel either in Great Britain or abroad for any purpose of an educational nature. The Endowments Trust shall require applicants for such grants to submit for their approval a statement of the purposes for which the journey is to be undertaken, the place to be visited, and the probable length of absence from home. In making such grants, the Endowments Trust shall have regard to the diligence, attainment and promise of the applicants. In determining the amount of each grant, the Endowments Trust shall have regard to the financial circumstances of the applicant (including any other bursaries or grants paid to him), and to the expenses likely to be incurred by him.

Educational excursions

36. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in defraying or assisting to defray the expenses of organised educational excursions for the benefit of pupils attending schools and young persons attending further education centre in the City. Without prejudice to the generality of the powers of the Endowments Trust under this Section, the said excursions may include visits to places of historical interest, museums, art galleries, zoological gardens, factories, workshops, exhibitions, ships, or any other places, and also attendances at lectures, concerts, performances and displays from which the said pupils and young persons are, in the opinion of the Endowments Trust, likely to derive educational benefit.

Educational travel

37. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in making grants to persons belonging to the City, who have not attained the age of twenty-one years and who are, or have been, during the immediately preceding session, pupils attending secondary schools or further education centres or are members of youth organisations approved for the purposes of this Section by the Endowments Trust to enable them to become members of parties organised by Grampian Regional Council or by any body or person approved by the Endowments Trust, for the

purpose of travelling in Great Britain or abroad, provided that the Endowments Trust is satisfied that the proposed journey is likely to be for the educational benefit of the persons applying for the grants.

Special equipment

38. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in making grants for improving the efficiency of education in any of the local authority, independent or grant-aided schools or further education centres in the City, by providing special equipment for such schools or centres in supplement to that which Grampian Regional Council or other managers of schools or centres may reasonably be expected to supply.

Sports facilities

39. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in assisting to provide and maintain playing fields, swimming baths and other accommodation for sports, with any necessary pavilions and other offices, for the benefit of children and young people resident in the City. They may also assist in defraying travelling expenses of school teams and the expenses of inter-school sports meetings, and in providing such apparatus and equipment, including personal equipment and sports clothing, as they think fit.

Support of Clubs, etc

40. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in making grants to clubs, societies and organisations in the City, which include among their activities work of an educational nature. The said grants shall be used for the purpose of promoting or assisting in the promotion of such educational work. Without prejudice to the generality of the powers of the Endowments Trust under this Section, the said grants may be made to assist in the establishment and maintenance of institutes and centres, and to provide or to assist in providing equipment, for such clubs, societies and organisations.

Adult education

41. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in promoting adult education in the City –

(1) by organising and defraying or assisting to organise and defray the expenses of lectures or other suitable types of instruction;

(2) by making grants to persons belonging to the City, who require financial aid to enable them to attend any institution or organised course for adult education.

In making such grants, the Endowments Trust shall have regard to the diligence, attainment and promise of the applicants. In determining the amount of each grant, the Endowments Trust shall have regard to the financial circumstances of the applicant (including any other bursaries or grants paid to him), and to the expenses likely to be incurred by him.

Promoting education in the visual arts

42. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in promoting education in the visual arts among persons belonging to the City –

(1) by granting assistance to any of the said persons who show exceptional promise in any of the visual arts and who require financial aid to enable them to obtain special tuition or to enable them to pursue private study under such conditions as may be approved by the Endowments Trust, and

(2) by organising and defraying or assisting to organise and defray the expenses of art exhibitions and of lectures and demonstrations on any of the visual arts.

Promoting education in music

43. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in promoting education in music among persons belonging to the City –

(1) by establishing, maintaining and equipping or assisting to establish, maintain and equip choirs, orchestras, bands and instrumental groups composed wholly or mainly of the said persons,

(2) by granting assistance to any of the said persons who show exceptional promise in vocal or instrumental music and who require financial aid to enable them, where necessary or desirable, to acquire a musical instrument, and to obtain special tuition or to enable them to pursue private study under such conditions as may be approved by the Endowments Trust, and

(3) by organising and defraying or assisting to organise and defray the expenses of musical performances and music lectures.

Promoting education in drama

44. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in promoting education in drama among persons belonging to the City –

(1) by establishing, maintaining and equipping or assisting to establish, maintain and equip dramatic groups composed wholly or mainly of the said persons,

(2) by assisting to establish and maintain a library of plays suitable for performance by such groups,

(3) by granting assistance to any of the said persons who show exceptional promise in dramatic art and who require financial aid to enable them to obtain special tuition or to enable them to pursue private study under such conditions as may be approved by the Endowments Trust, and

(4) by organising and defraying or assisting to organise and defray the expenses of dramatic performances and of lectures and demonstrations in dramatic art.

Educational experiments and research

45. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in assisting such bodies and persons as may be approved by them to undertake educational experiments and research which in the opinion of the Endowments Trust will be for the educational benefit of persons belonging to the City.

Grants for second or subsequent degrees

46. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year make grants to persons belonging to the City, who have obtained a degree or other qualification from a University or other Institution of Further or Higher Education, to enable them to obtain a second degree or other qualification.

Grants for further or higher education

47. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year make grants to enable persons belonging to the City, to prepare for entrance to a University or Institution of Further or Higher Education. Recipients of such grants shall be persons of 18 years of age or over who do not possess the qualifications necessary for entry into such a University or Institution.

Bursaries for further or higher education

48. - Where provision is made in the plan for expenditure under this Section, the Endowments Trust may in each financial year expend a sum not exceeding the maximum sum so provided in awarding bursaries of such annual value as they think fit to persons belonging to the City, who are about to enter or who are in attendance at a University or any Institution of Further or Higher Education, or who are about to register or who have registered for Open University courses.

TRANSACTIONS WITH COLLEGE GOVERNORS

Loans to College Governors

49. - (1) Subject to the provisions of subsections (2) and (3) of this Section, the Endowments Trust shall, when required by the College Governors, incur capital expenditure in making loans to the College Governors of such sum or sums as the College Governors may require for capital expenditure for the purposes of or in connection with the school.

(2) The total sum which may be lent at any time under the last foregoing subsection shall not exceed £100,000.00.

(3) The annual payments to be made from the free income of the Trust under Section 17 in respect of capital expenditure under subsection (1) of this Section shall be a first charge against the sum available for the purposes of Section 50 and, in the event of the said sum not being sufficient, against the sum available for the purposes of subsection (1) of Section 29, and shall be deducted by the Endowments Trust from the sums payable to the College Governors under these Sections. Such deductions shall be deemed to be payments of instalments of principal and interest by the College Governors to the Endowments Trust.

(4) It shall be in the power of the Endowments Trust, subject to the provisions of Section 17, to incur capital expenditure in addition to that authorised by subsection (1) of this Section in

making loans to the College Governors for capital expenditure for the purposes of or in connection with the School upon such terms and conditions as may be agreed upon by the Endowments Trust and the College Governors.

Payment of residue to College Governors

50. - The Endowments Trust shall, subject to such deductions as may be required under Sections 27 and 49, pay the residue of the free income of the Trust to the College Governors.

PART V

FUNCTIONS OF THE GOVERNORS OF ROBERT GORDON'S COLLEGE

Provision of education

51. - (1) From and after the date of this Scheme, the College Governors shall, in continuation and development of Robert Gordon's College, provide, maintain, furnish, equip, administer and conduct a school for boys in which the curriculum shall include courses of primary and secondary education. They shall provide, lay out, maintain, equip and administer playing fields and other accommodation for sports and recreation for use in connection with the School.

(2) The College Governors shall, subject to the provisions of this Scheme, have all the rights, powers and privileges necessary or expedient to enable them to carry this Section into effect.

Application of capital and income

52. - (1) The College Governors shall receive into the Secondary School Cash Capital Fund any sums received by them as managers of the School and payable into the fund under Section 22 or subsection (2) of Section 59 or otherwise, and shall, after paying any necessary expenses of management and the burdens and taxes affecting the fund, add the balance of income to the capital of the fund, and it shall be in their power to expend the capital of the fund in executing those functions under subsection (1) of the last foregoing Section to which capital may properly be devoted.

(2) The College Governors shall credit to the School Maintenance Account the income received by them for the maintenance of the School by way of fees, contributions, grants or otherwise and shall, after paying any necessary expenses of management and the burdens and taxes payable by them as manager of the School, apply the free income of the Account in executing their functions under subsection (1) of the last foregoing Section. If at the end of any financial year there is an unexpended balance of income, the College Governors shall carry the said balance or part thereof forward to the following financial year or shall transfer the said balance or part thereof to the Secondary School Cash Capital Fund.

Application of residue received from Endowments Trust

53. - (1) The College Governors shall credit to the School Maintenance Account such part of the residue received by them from the Endowments Trust under Section 50 as is required for the purpose set forth in the next following subsection.

(2) The purpose referred to in the last foregoing subsection shall be to make good any deficit arising in connection with the execution of the functions of the College Governors under subsection (1) of Section 51, after taking into account sums received in fees and any grants from the Secretary of State.

Standing committees, etc.

54. - (1) It shall be in the power of the College Governors to appoint such standing committees and sub-committees of their own number as they deem expedient and the provisions of subsection (1) of Section 19 shall apply thereto.

(2) Notwithstanding anything contained in the last foregoing subsection it shall be in the power of the College Governors to appoint as additional members of any standing committee or sub-committee, persons not being governors whom the College Governors deem specially fitted to assist in the work of the standing committee or sub-committee. Any person so appointed shall hold office for such time as the College Governors may determine and shall during that time hold the same position on the committee or sub-committee as if he had been a governor.

Dismissal of certificated teachers

55. - The provisions of subsections (1), (3) and (4) of Section 88 of the Education (Scotland) Act, 1980, shall apply to the College Governors and the certificated teachers employed by them in the School for such period of time as the College remains a Grant-Aided School or for such duration as the governors may continue to adopt the conditions of service as laid down by the Scottish Joint Negotiating Committee for Teaching Staff.

Suspension of staff

56. - (1) It shall be in the power of the College Governors summarily to suspend any member of the staff of the School from the exercise of his functions. It shall be in the power of the Headmaster of the School, if in his opinion immediate action is necessary, to suspend any member of the staff of the School, provided that the Headmaster shall report the action he has taken and the reasons therefor to the College Governors within two days.

(2) Suspension under this Section shall not affect the rights of the person suspended to salary or other emoluments attached to his post.

Status of Headmaster

57. - The College Governors shall make rules under Section 23 defining the status and functions of the Headmaster of the School.

Retiring allowances

58. - It shall be in the power of the College Governors to grant a pension or retiring allowance to or to supplement the pension or retiring allowance of any member of the teaching staff or of any other officer of the College Governors on such terms and for such period as the College Governors deem expedient.

Admission to the School

59. - (1) Subject to the provisions of Section 29, the College Governors shall admit to the School all boys suitable in respect of age, health and character for whom accommodation is available. It shall be in the power of the College Governors to charge such reasonable fees for attendance at the School as they think fit, and to remit in whole or in part the fees of boys who are orphans or whose

parents are in such financial circumstances as to require aid in providing education for their children at the School.

(2) The College Governors may include in any fees charged under this subsection, an element for the purpose of increasing and maintaining the Secondary School Cash Capital Fund and the fees charged shall specify the amount of the said element.

Affiliation, etc.

60. - It shall be in the power of the College Governors to enter into arrangements or to co-operate with any persons, educational institutions, schools or associations having educational objects wholly or in part similar to those of the College Governors for the purposes of or incidental to the educational work of the College Governors upon such terms and conditions as may be arranged.

Special funds

61. - The College Governors shall, after paying any necessary expenses of management and the burdens and taxes affecting each of the funds named in column (2) of Part II(b) of the First Schedule, apply the free income of each fund in executing the purpose set forth in column (3) opposite the respective funds named in the said column (2). If at the end of any financial year there is an unexpended balance of income of any of the said funds it shall be in the power of the College Governors to carry the said balance or part thereof forward to the following financial year or to add the said balance or part thereof to the capital of the said fund.

PART VI

FUNCTIONS OF THE GRAMPIAN REGIONAL COUNCIL

Grampian Regional Council Prize Fund

62. - (1) The Council shall, after paying any necessary expenses of management and the burdens and taxes affecting the Grampian Regional Council Prize Fund, apply the free income thereof in awarding the prizes described in the Fifth Schedule. The number to be awarded shall be that stated opposite to the name of the prize in column (3) of the said Schedule, or, where no number is stated, such a number as the Council think fit. If any school mentioned in column (5) of the said Schedule is discontinued, it shall be in the power of the Council to award the prizes attached thereto to pupils attending the school to which the greatest number of the pupils formerly attending the discontinued school were transferred.

(2) If at the end of any financial year there is an unexpended balance of income, it shall be in the power of the Council to expend the said balance or part thereof in awarding under such conditions as they think fit, additional prizes to pupils attending public schools in the City, or to carry the said balance or part thereof forward to the following financial year, or to add the said balance or part thereof to the capital of the fund.

(3) If at any time the ratio between the income of the Grampian Regional Council Prize Fund and the aggregate of the sums set forth in the Fifth Schedule shall be materially altered by an increase or decrease in the said income, it shall be in the power of the Council to restore the said ratio by making an increase or decrease in each of the said sums.

Other funds

63. - (1) The Council shall, after paying any necessary expenses of management and the burdens and taxes affecting each of the funds to which this Section relates, apply the free income of each fund in executing the purpose set forth in the subsection of this Section relating thereto. If at the end of any financial year there is an unexpended balance of income in any of the said funds, it shall be in the power of the Council to carry the said balance or part thereof forward to the following financial year or to add the said balance or part thereof to the capital of the said fund.

(2) The Council shall apply the free income of the Murray Pictures Fund for the purpose of promoting knowledge and love of art among the children of the City. They shall maintain and may extend the Murray Circulating Collection and may replace pictures and add to existing sets of pictures and shall make the Collection available in whole or in part for circulation among educational establishments in the City. It shall be in the power of the Council to award each year prizes and certificates to pupils attending schools in the City for the most meritorious essays on pictures in the Collection and to publish any essay of exceptional merit.

(3) The Council shall apply the free income of the James Findlay Prize Fund in awarding annually a prize or prizes to be known as the James Findlay Prize or Prizes to a student or students attending Aberdeen College of Education for excellence in teaching practice and, before awarding the prize or prizes, shall consult the Principal of the said College.

(4) The Council shall apply the free income of the Liddel Prize Fund in awarding annually a prize, which may take the form of a medal, to an undergraduate at Aberdeen University, for the best composition in Latin and Greek in alternate years. The conditions governing the award of the prize shall be determined by the Professors in the Faculty of Arts at the said University. The prizes shall be known as the Liddel Prize or Medal, as the case may be.

PART VII

GENERAL AND MISCELLANEOUS PROVISIONS

Co-operation between Endowments Trust, College Governors and Grampian Regional Council

64. - (1) The Endowments Trust may, if they find it expedient, and shall, if so requested by the College Governors or the Grampian Regional Council, meet or appoint a committee to meet the College Governors or the Grampian Regional Council or a committee of either body with regard to any matter arising out of the awards and payments made by the Endowments Trust under this Scheme affecting the College Governors in the execution of their functions under this Scheme or the Grampian Regional Council in the execution of their functions as Education Authority or under this Scheme. The Endowments Trust shall receive and consider any representations made to them by the College Governors or the Grampian Regional Council with regard to the exercise by the Endowments Trust of their functions under this Scheme.

(2) The Endowments Trust and the College Governors shall be entitled, with the consent of the Grampian Regional Council, to consult and obtain the advice of the Director of Education of the Grampian Regional Council with regard to the exercise of any of their respective functions under this Scheme.

Continuation of benefits

65. - It shall be in the power of each governing body to permit any person who at the date of this Scheme is a beneficiary under any of the endowments vested in the said governing body under this Scheme to continue to enjoy the benefit which he enjoyed prior to the said date subject to the conditions under which it was awarded until the expiry of the said person's period of tenure of the said benefit.

Limitation of value of awards

66. - The value of any scholarship, bursary, grant or prize awarded by a governing body under this Scheme to a person who holds, or is to hold, an award by a Local Authority or the Scottish Education Department, shall not be of such amount as will require the grant awarding body to reduce the amount of the award made, or to be made, by them.

Withdrawal of awards

67. - Each governing body shall require the holder of any foundation, scholarship, bursary or grant awarded by them under this Scheme to satisfy them that he is making satisfactory progress in his course of study or training. If in the opinion of a governing body any such holder shall be guilty of serious misconduct or shall fail to make reasonable progress, the said governing body may withdraw the foundation, scholarship, bursary or grant or suspend the holder from the benefits thereof, and their determination in such case shall be final.

Availability of Scheme

69. - Each governing body shall maintain a supply of copies of this Scheme and shall cause a copy to be kept available for inspection by every member and officer and of committee thereof.

Interpretation

70. - (1) In this Scheme unless the context otherwise requires –

“children” shall not be so construed as to confine the benefits of any section of this Scheme to persons under 16 years of age.

“City” means the former City and Royal Burgh of Aberdeen including the areas added under the Aberdeen Extension Order 1969.

“College Governors” means the Governors of Robert Gordon's College.

“Corporation of the City of Aberdeen” means the Lord Provost, Magistrates and Councillors of the former Corporation of the City of Aberdeen.

“date of this Scheme” means the date upon which the Court of Session granted approval.

“Endowments Trust” means the Aberdeen Endowments Trust.

“financial year” has the following meanings, that is to say:-

In the case of the Endowments Trust the period beginning on the 1st day of January and terminating on the 31st day of December each year; in the case of the College Governors the period beginning on the 1st day of August in one year and terminating on the 31st day of July in the following year; beginning and terminating on the dates upon which the general accounts of the Grampian Regional Council are opened and closed.

“governing body” means the Endowments Trust, the College Governors or the Grampian Regional Council, as the case may be, acting as a governing body under this Scheme.

“governor” means a member of the College Governors.

“Grampian Regional Council” means the Convener and Councillors of the Council.

“Order of 1909” means the Robert Gordon’s Technical College and Aberdeen Endowments Trust Order, 1909, confirmed by the Robert Gordon’s Technical College and Aberdeen Endowments Trust Order Confirmation Act, 1909.

Each foundation, partially funded place or assisted bursary awarded under this subsection shall be held subject to the conditions under which it would have been held if it had been awarded under subsection (1) of this Section. (6) Deleted.
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(7) In the event of any foundation or bursary offered by the Endowments Trust under this Section not being awarded on account of failure to find duly qualified candidates, or of any foundation or bursary lapsing owing to the death of the holder, or his resignation of the foundation or bursary, or his removal from school, or the withdrawal or suspension of the foundation or bursary, it shall be in the power of the Endowments Trust to transfer the balances arising thereby to the Lapsed and Unallocated Foundations and Bursaries Fund, provided that separate accounts shall be kept of balances arising through the failure of the following types of foundation or bursary, that is to say:- Robert Gordon's Foundations restricted to orphans and poor boys; Robert Gordon's Foundations not so restricted; Robert Gordon's Bursaries; Secondary School Bursaries for Boys and Girls.

Payments for free education at Robert Gordon's College

(7) In the event of any foundation, partially funded place, assisted bursary or secondary school bursary offered by the Endowments Trust under this Section not being awarded on account of failure to find duly qualified candidates, or of any foundation, partially funded place, assisted bursary or secondary school bursary lapsing owing to the death of the holder, or his resignation of the foundation, partially funded place, assisted bursary or secondary school bursary, or his removal from school, or the withdrawal or suspension of the foundation, partially funded place, assisted bursary or secondary school bursary, it shall be in the power of the Endowments Trust to transfer the balances arising thereby to the Lapsed and Unallocated Foundations and Bursaries Fund, provided that separate accounts shall be kept of balances arising through the failure of the following types of foundation, partially funded place, assisted bursary or secondary school bursary, that is to say:- Robert Gordon's Foundations and Partially Funded Places restricted to orphans and poor pupils; Robert Gordon's Foundations not so restricted; Robert Gordon's Bursaries and Assisted Bursaries; Secondary School Bursaries for Boys and Girls.

Payments for free and partially funded education at Robert Gordon's College

29. - (1) As before.

(2) In respect of the payments to be made under the last foregoing subsection, the College Governors shall provide free and partially funded education at the School for such number of pupils as shall be agreed between the Governors of Robert Gordon's College and the Trustees of the

such other boys as may be nominated by the Endowments Trust in accordance with the provisions of this subsection. The said other boys shall be known as Robert Gordon's Bursars. Robert Gordon's Bursars shall be nominated from among boys who are already in attendance at the School or are about to be admitted to the School who are orphans or whose parents are in such financial circumstances as to require aid in providing education for their children at the School. In awarding the bursaries, the Endowments Trust shall have regard to the diligence, attainment and promise of the candidates. (3) The Endowments Trust and the College Governors shall enter into agreements as to the annual sum to be paid to the College Governors, as to the number of Robert Gordon's Bursars to be nominated, as to the methods and conditions of nomination, as to the period and conditions of tenure of Robert Gordon's Bursaries and generally as to any matter arising under this Section. (4) It shall be in the power of the Endowments Trust to expend a sum not exceeding £400.00 in each financial year in paying grants of such amount as they think expedient to the most necessitous of the Robert Gordon's Bursars. (5) In the event of the Endowments Trust and the College Governors failing to reach agreement under this Section, the matter shall be referred to a mutually agreed person as arbiter, and the decision of the arbiter shall be final. The expenses of the arbitration as approved by the arbiter shall be defrayed from the sums directed to be paid under this Section to the College Governors.
