Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The Church is administered under the terms of the Unitary Constitution.

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees

Members of the Kirk Session are the charity trustees. The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery.

Organisational Structure

The Kirk Session, which in 2023, has met 9 times, meets in person wherever possible and is responsible for the spiritual and temporal affairs within the church.

Objectives and Activities

The Church of Scotland is Trinitarian in doctrine, Reformed in tradition and Presbyterian in governance. It exists to glorify God and to work for the advancement of Christ's Kingdom throughout the world. As a national Church, it acknowledges a distinctive call to bring the ordinances of religion to the people in every parish of Scotland. It cooperates with other Churches in various ecumenical bodies in Scotland and beyond.

Flemington-Hallside Church of Scotland holds weekly worship services at 11 a.m. on Sunday mornings. The Church also works with Churches of various denominations within Cambuslang. Within the Church there meets a number of Church organisations including a Sunday School, a Guild, a Boys' Brigade and Girls' Brigade; in addition to the Church's premises being used for the Church's weekly prayer meeting and Community Cafe. The Church hall is also used by a fitness class and as a polling station, out of school care group, and parent and toddler group.

The foundation of the Church's life continues to be weekly Sunday morning worship. Continued efforts are made to keep these services faithful, innovative and engaging. The Church youth ministry has continued to innovate and meets on Sunday evenings and engage with the local community. The Church continues to be used for occasional funerals, weddings, baptisms and blessings and is a key centre for marking significant events in life throughout the community. We have continued to see young people in our Church participate in Sunday Worship and in the wider Church and our youth organisations continue in their outreach.

Achievements and Performance

The overall statement of our circumstances through 2023 remains as it has been since the Covid pandemic – profound concern that the congregation has not 'bounced back' to where we were before 'lockdown'. Attendance and income continue to be below prepandemic levels. As in recent years, while some 'new folk', including some young adults, have started attending Sunday morning services, these numbers do not replace those that have not returned.

Rather than constantly refer to not going back to pre-pandemic levels, the harsh decisions regarding the future need to be assessed on the basis of where we are now – we are not going back to where we were. It was said last year but bears repeating, the Church of Scotland does not have an internal culture today to address the paradigm shifts in our society – Covid-19 was merely 'the final straw' – certainly not the primary cause of our situation. A prayerful seeking after God's response to this situation, should be an on-going prayer focus for us all.

Positives do very much exist – The Guild continues to thrive and be an active fellowship; 'Meat & 2 Veg' continues to feed the poor in our community during the cost-of-living crisis in Christ's name; the schools work continues to be welcomed and enjoyed by the local children. The fact that we are meeting our present annual 'Giving to Grow' financial commitments to '121' and have only got 'Covid debts' of £10,000 in the present church financial world is testimony to the congregation's financial commitment to their Saviour and to their congregation. Moreover, ending this financial year with a surplus of £7,600 makes it clear we are 'cutting our cloth' within our means. The Sunday School, afterservice tea and the Prayer Meeting along with B.B. and G.B. companies all continue. Our fundamental objectives and achievements were: the gospel was still preached; the sacraments still received; loved-ones' funerals were carried out and fellowship continues to pray for a growing congregation.

Throughout the year the Junior Church Sunday School work continued in the morning during the Sunday service. The Senior Sunday School work continued at 6.30 p.m. Messy Church continued and appears to be making progress. Messy Church had events where 40+ people attended with people being mostly non-church based. A two-day summer holiday club with 35+ children (with latest Scripture Union Holiday Club material) was also held in August. There are literally too many people to thank individually but I simply say a 'big thank you' to all who were involved in these events – that they took place indicates the commitment of those involved to make the gospel real in this community. One-offs and week by week events speak to the reality of people's faith and their wish to share it.

Financial Review

The principal source of income is weekly offerings which have increased slightly from $\pounds734$ weekly to $\pounds739$. We continue to encourage the use of standing orders, as a means of enabling regular giving, and also in a way which easily facilitates the claiming back of Gift Aid. The number of people giving their offering by standing order is 38.

The main source of fundraising is from the Christmas Fayre and Summer Fun Day. The Summer Fun Day raised £641, and the Christmas Fayre raised a marvellous total of $\pounds 2640$. Although this was slightly less than last year, it was still a good result.

During the year we were very grateful to receive a very generous donation of ± 5000 towards updating the sound system and a new TV. We were also very grateful to receive a legacy of ± 2000 towards this much needed upgrade.

Total fabric expenditure for the year was low, totalling £5185. The main items being repairs to pipework under vestry floor leading to the boiler house £2428, flat roor repair above back door entrance and Rentokil £1082.

Our Community Café has remained open throughout the year, and although would benefit from a rise in customer numbers, is still supported by faithful regulars. The main purpose of the Café is to deepen relationships with the congregation and local community. The Café made a much welcome donation of £2,000 to the church in 2023. This figure is included in the donations total in Note 3.

Overall we had a surplus of £13038 for 2023. Unfortunately we have Ministries & Mission payments outstanding at the end of the year totalling £10,000, but we still have Gift Aid to receive.

Our Youth Work continued, and the balance in this fund at 31st December 2023 was £13603. We remain very grateful to folks who contribute to this fund.

Reserves Policy

It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately three to six months' expenditure including designated funds. At the year end the Church held unrestricted cash funds of £35399 in case of any unexpected fabric expenditure. Restricted funds of a combined balance of £21590 are also held for the purposes specified in note 2, page 11.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The members of the Kirk Session must prepare financial statements which give sufficient detail to enable an appreciation of the transactions of the Church during the financial year. The members of the Kirk Session are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which, on request, must reflect the financial position of the Church at that time. This must be done to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended) and the Regulations Anent Congregational Finance approved by the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland in 2016. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Church and must take reasonable steps for the prevention and/or detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Flemington-Hallside Parish Church

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2023 which are set out on pages 9-13.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The charity trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (d) of the Accounts Regulation does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeks explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.
