
The Trustees have pleasure in presenting their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2024.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Haddington Garden Trust SCIO is a charitable Trust and the purposes and administration arrangements are set out in our Constitution of 2019. The Trust is responsible for the management of St. Mary's Pleasance, the community garden of 0.65 hectares located within the Royal Burgh of Haddington.
The Trustees have delegated the day-to-day management of the community garden to a Garden Committee which operates under the chairmanship of who attends and reports to the Trustees at their regular meetings. The Trustees remain responsible for all statutory, employment and fund-raising matters.
The Garden Committee works closely with the Trustees and formally reports to the Trustees twice in each year to plan budgets and to report outcomes.
OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES
The Trust holds title to the garden adjoining Haddington House. Its purposes are to preserve the garden for the public benefit and to develop the garden as an old Scottish garden.
St Mary's Pleasance Garden is a heritage walled garden and occupies about 0.65 hectares (1.6 acres) between St. Mary's Churchyard, Lady Kitty's Garden and Haddington House, which dates from 1648. The main access to the garden is from Sidegate, one of the oldest streets in the Royal Burgh. The garden was designed by the architect specification of the late form of the late form of the garden's boundary walls were built by Napoleonic prisoners of war. The design reflects the features of a 17th century Scottish garden. It contains a mount and sunken garden, both period features. There is also a boxed hombeam walk, cottage garden, orchard and meadow, period rose border and raised herb beds. The pleached allee of laburnum is spectacular in May and June. As far as is possible, all the trees, shrubs and herbs are types known to have been in existence in Scotland in the 17th century. The trees in the orchard represent varieties from the 17th to the early 20th century, including White Melrose, Galloway Pippin, Stobo Castle and Stirling Castle. The meadow is planted with spring bulbs and wildflowers to provide a display from snowdrops early in the year to oxlips in April. Summer wildflowers then take over.
ACHIEVEMENTS, PERFORMANCE and IMPACT
In the year ending December 2024 Grants and Donations were received from charitable bodies and individuals.
A generous donation was made by the AEB Trust for a tree to commemorate Queen Elizabeth and towards the core costs of the garden.
The trustees acknowledge the gratitude the Stevenston Charitable Trust's multi-year commitment to the maintenance of the garden.
A grant from The Stanley Smith (UK) Horticultural Trust was generously awarded and has enabled the replanting and enhancement of the Cottage Garden.
The Trustees are indebted to East Lothian Council One Council Partnership Fund and other donors including individuals both named and anonymous for their generosity. These contributions enabled the Trustees to install a stone sundial in the sunken garden which was beautifully crafted and installed by trainees at The Ridge in Dunbar.
We were delighted to welcome our new gardener, who is an asset, helping to maintain and upkeep the garden and engage with the community who visited the garden during 2024. It is supported by two new volunteers. The Trust will be holding an Open Afternoon in spring 2025 to develop its volunteer programme.

and maintained good links with Blooming Haddington, East Lothian Council and other community groups.

All aspects of the garden are in good shape and much admired.

This summer St Mary's Pleasance Garden was delighted to be chosen as the Beautiful Scotland, Discretionary Award Winner through Blooming Haddington.

As it is over 40 years since it was first created the various features of the garden are undergoing renewal as part of a rolling 5-year programme. This year work has focused on replanting an area that was cleared in 2017 - see Garden Report.

We were able to realise our refurbishment and refresh the Cottage Garden, with help from plants supplied by *MacPlants* and to Blooming Haddington volunteers who worked hard with the preparation and planting. We look forward to seeing the results in 2025.



A variety of hawthorn tree has been planted at the heart of Haddington to mark the coronation of King Charles III. Lord Lieutenant for East Lothian, was joined by his predecessor MBE, chairman of Haddington Garden Trust, to plant the special hawthorn tree.



The wet, early summer planting ceremony was also attended by the Haddington Garden Trustees and some locals.

The Wild Flower Meadow in the orchard is progressing well, the new period roses established and there was a good harvest of fruit, nuts and vegetables which were made available for sale.

The new Walk Around the Garden booklet is a fantastic resource and proving helpful to guide those visiting, such as the Edinburgh U3A did in the summer.



We hosted another film set booking and weddings/ photo shoots in the garden and is an important income stream.

Progress has been made in partnership with East Lothian Council on the plans for repairing the boundary wall. A planning application will be submitted in early 2025 and plans to appoint a contractor to undertake the works later in the year are well underway so that we can bring the rear area of the garden back to top condition.

We have had good feedback from a wide range of individuals and groups who have enjoyed the quality and ambience of the garden. We seem to have got the balance between footfall in the garden and tranquillity about right.

The Garden continues to provide a significant resource for the local community. We enjoy welcoming the nursery, young parents and junior library groups who use the garden for recreation and learning, along with the local camera and painting clubs.

- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. INDENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF THE HADDINGTON GARDEN TRUST YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31st December 2024 which are set out on pages 7 to 11.

Respective responsibilities of Trustees and examiner

The charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006. The Charity Trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (a) to (c) of the Accounts Regulations does not apply. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2024

The Trust is a charitable incorporated organisation, and its principal office is Lennoxlove Estate Office, Lennoxlove Haddington, East Lothian, EH41 4NZ. The Trust was formed with the principal objective of the management of St. Mary's Pleasance, the community garden of 0.65 hectares located within the Royal Burgh of Haddington.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

General

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective (1 January 2019), Financial Reporting Standard 102 applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland, the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended).

The Trust meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note. The accounts are presented in sterling and are rounded to the nearest £.

The Trust has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

Going Concern

The Trustees consider that the current financial position of the Trust, together with prudent management, will ensure that the Trust will continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future, and they therefore continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

Income recognition

All income is recognised in the SOFA when the Trust is legally entitled to the income and the amounts can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Donations and gift aid receipts are recognised on receipt.

Expenditure recognition

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Trust to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accrual's basis. The Trust is not registered for VAT therefore all VAT is charged against the expenditure heading for which it was incurred.

Fixed Assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost.
