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### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2024

The Trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 October 2024. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### Objectives and aims

The primary objective of the Russell Anderson Foundation ('RAF') is to improve the quality of life and life chances of young people in the socially deprived area of St. Machar, Aberdeen. The particular objectives are:

- To promote, through sports and life coaching, the personal development, health and well-being of young people
- To provide, or assisting in the provision of, services to support young people in their personal development
- To develop the practical skills of young people, thus allowing them to increase their level of activity and to
  encourage them to become active members of their community
- To focus the attention of the local community on social issues, with a view to creating a sense of individual and community responsibility
- To promote and enhance our volunteer development programme

# ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities

RAF continues to use sport as a strategic engagement tool to support children in developing positive relationships with physical activity and healthy lifestyles. Our approach is holistic, addressing the physical, emotional, and social challenges faced by young people in our communities.

RAF delivers a range of health-focused programmes designed to increase physical activity levels, promote wellbeing, and foster long-term behavioural change. These initiatives are complemented by volunteering and employability projects that enhance future opportunities for children and young adults.

As of this year, RAF coaches provide free daily coaching sessions across 11 partner schools, engaging over 2,500 children each week. These sessions are embedded within the school day and are designed to be inclusive, consistent, and aligned with the Foundation's values of fairness, empowerment, and long-term impact.

### Significant activities

Some of our achievements over the last year are listed below:

- Coaches present in 10 partner schools.
- Over 2,200 children participate weekly in the coaching sessions.
- 245 weekly coaching hours across partner schools.
- Over 300 participants at Holiday Sports Camps. There is no charge to the children for attending the camps.
- Over 12,000 food items delivered to local community food banks.
- Strengthened partnerships with local companies, allowing RAF to further enhance our after-school club offering and develop a Community Skills Hub at Kirkhill Primary School.
- Support in the delivery of cooking, food preparation and basic hygiene classes in the new skills room kitchen at Kirkhill Primary School.
- Expansion of our Young Leaders programme with 85 Young Leaders taking on this role. The Young Leaders programme has become a huge success. P7 pupils are given the opportunity to apply for a position to support our team of coaches in delivering sessions to the younger classes in their school. Initially responsible for helping to plan sessions and coaching small aspects, the programme aims to improve planning and communication skills, enabling pupils to eventually design and present their own, full sessions. P7 pupils from each school are brought together to collaborate and share ideas which they then take back to their own schools. The Young Leader role helps with self-esteem and confidence as well as allowing pupils the opportunity to build new friendships before they transition to secondary school.
- Introduction of a First Aid qualification for Young Leaders.
- Involvement in 'NHS Widening Participation Partnership' we have worked with the National Health Service to deliver a widening participation scheme to pupils across all of our partner schools. This involves NHS staff and students visiting classes to deliver presentations and practical lessons, focusing on several different aspects of health and well-being. Topics covered by the NHS professionals are often incorporated into our coaches' weekly sports sessions. Younger classes have received lessons to understand the structure of the body whilst also being taught about dental hygiene. Older classes have been given basic first aid tuition and the opportunity to visit medical buildings. The scheme is also being extended to the secondary schools we work within, allowing continued education and ultimately offering career opportunities and pathways for the pupils.
- Upgrades to the Russell Anderson Foundation website and social media engagement, improving the user
  experience and allowing a wider audience reach, thus spreading greater awareness of the charity.

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2024

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

### Financial position

The financial results are as set out in the attached financial statements.

Total income generated by the Charity in the year equated to £493,557 (2023: £325,814). Total expenditure incurred by the Charity in the year equated to £451,927 (2023 - £324,809). The surplus generated in the year to 31 October 2024 was £41,630 (2023 - £1,005). The unrestricted funds as at 31 October 2024 totalled £156,943 (2023: £114,864).

### Principal funding sources

The Charity mainly generates its funding through donations and grants from sponsors who are primarily based in the North East of Scotland, as well as fundraising events (charity dinner and golf day).

### Reserves policy

It is the intention of the Trustees to accumulate an unrestricted reserve fund to provide sufficient protection and to mitigate against future economic conditions.

## Going concern

The Charity has cash resources and currently has no requirement for external loans. The Trustees undertake detailed budgeting to monitor the Charity's activities. The Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

We are delighted at the progress made in developing the initiatives offered throughout the year and plan to further enhance these going forward to continue delivering on the aim of improving the quality of life for young people growing up in areas of social deprivation.

A key aspect of this is the continued investment in training for coaches, providing them with opportunities to develop their own knowledge and experience which they can then utilise to deliver effective and engaging sessions in partner schools.

We will continue to expand our involvement in the community skills hub programme, helping to build a robust social infrastructure and solid foundations within the St Machar area of Aberdeen, enabling us to undertake more work in the future.

RAF also plans to increase the number of partner schools we work with, including increased collaboration with St Machar Academy, thus allowing pupils to continue their involvement with RAF as they progress through their education journey.

The transition support for Lochside (ASG) is for P7's in the local catchment area (six schools): Tullos, Abbotswell, Kirkhill, Greyhope and in addition, 2 x Cove primary schools (Loirston and Charlton) who attend this event only.

## STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

### Governing document

Russell Anderson Foundation was registered with HMRC and the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator (Scottish Charity Number SC047881) on 31 October 2017. The Trust is administered in accordance with the terms of the Trust Deed.

### **Group structure**

Russell Anderson Foundation is registered with the Scottish Charity Regulator (Scottish Charity Number SC047881) in the constitutional form of a SCIO (Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation).

### Recruitment and appointment of new Trustees

The Trustees are responsible for the strategy and governance of the charity and monitoring performance in line with the strategic objectives. The appointment and removal of Trustees is in accordance with the Trust Deed which requires that an appointment is approved by unanimous agreement of the existing Trustees and a removal of any Trustee also by the unanimous agreement of the others. In accordance with the Trust Deed, Trustees can be elected annually, or at any time by majority. One third of the Trustees (or nearest number) will retire at the AGM, but may be re-elected, subject to eligibility. Those Trustees will be the longest in office.

### Organisational structure / decision making

The board of Trustees is responsible for the overall direction and management of the Charity and meets regularly. The Trustees appoint a Chief Executive Officer who is responsible for the day-to-day management of the Charity.

### Induction and training of new Trustees

Once appointed, Trustees receive an induction from the Chief Executive Officer who provides guidance on the responsibilities of the role and the background of the Charity. Trustees attend organised training sessions and development sessions with coaches, as appropriate, to enhance their knowledge and gain first hand experience of the work being performed 'on the ground' in partner schools.

### Key management remuneration

The Trustees consider the Board of Trustees and the Chief Executive Officer as comprising the key management personnel of the charity. They are in charge of directing and controlling the charity and running and operating the charity on a day to day basis.

Trustees give of their time freely and no Trustee remuneration was paid in the year, other than to the Chief Executive Officer who also served as a Trustee during the year.

The pay of the Chief Executive Officer is reviewed annually and bench-marked with charities of a similar size and activity to ensure that the remuneration set is fair and not out of line with that generally paid for similar roles.

## Risk management/ principal risks

The Trustees have examined the major risks to which the Charity is exposed. In particular, they examined those related to Operations, Governance, Finance, Compliance and External Factors which may have an impact on the Charity. They are satisfied systems are in place in order to mitigate exposure to the major risks. The Trustees continue to review their policies as part of the Charity's ongoing risk assessments and continuous improvement.

# STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2024

The charity Trustees are responsible for preparing a Trustees' annual report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

The law applicable to charities in Scotland requires the charity Trustees to prepare financial statements for each year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, of the charity for that period. In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the applicable Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005, the Charity Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended), and the provisions of the Trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the charity and financial information included on the charity's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

# INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF RUSSELL ANDERSON FOUNDATION

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 October 2024 which are set out on pages 8 to 21.

### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005 and the Charities Accounts (Scotland) Regulations 2006 (as amended). The charity Trustees consider that the audit requirement of Regulation 10(1) (a) to (c) of the 2006 Accounts Regulations does not apply. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts as required under section 44(1) (c) of the Act and to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

### Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination is carried out in accordance with Regulation 11 of the 2006 Accounts Regulations. # NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2024

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## Basis of preparing the financial statements

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

The financial statements of the charity have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)' and Financial reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland'. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

### Going concern

The Charity has cash resources and currently has no requirement for external loans. The Trustees undertake detailed budgeting to monitor the Charity's activities. The Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the Charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the Charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount can be measured reliably.

### Expenditure

Costs relating to charitable activities are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on an accruals basis, inclusive of any irrecoverable Value Added Tax. Expenditure is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to pay for expenditure.

Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Charitable activities costs includes costs attributable to the provision of support and related services incurred directly in meeting the objects of the Charity and support costs incurred in support of the direct costs.

Governance costs, a category within support costs, are costs attributable to compliance with the Charity's constitutional and statutory requirements.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - continued FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2024

## 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### Taxation

The Charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are funds which are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the Charity.

The unrestricted general fund represents unrestricted funds which have not been designated for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are those received subject to a specific purpose imposed by the donor. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

### **Employee benefits**

The Charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

#### Debtors

Debtor control account debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due with appropriate allowances for any irrecoverable amounts when there is objective evidence that the asset is impaired.

### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the balance sheet comprise cash on hand and cash at bank with a short term maturity, being twelve months or less, from the opening of the deposit or similar account.

### Creditors

Creditors control account creditors and accruals are recognised where the Charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors control account creditors and accruals are recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.
