The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2023. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Report from Rev Tommy MacNeil

As I begin this year's report allow me to be honest with you. There are times as your minister that I think to myself, 'That's enough work and development for now. Let's stop and camp for a little while'. You may agree! But here's the thing. The work and witness of Martin's Memorial is not my work and it's not your work. It's Christ's work. The fact is my main role as your pastor and leader is to keep in step with the Spirit and to remain on time with God's plans and purposes. At the end of another year, I can say wholeheartedly that we are in step, and we are on time. Praise be to God!

The fact that we as a church are constantly on the move and developing our work should not be a surprise to us. This reflects who God is and how God works. One of the most amazing truths about the universe that God created is that when He said, 'Let there be light' He called everything into being, and having called for light and life to come, He didn't tell it to stop and so our universe continues to expand as ever more powerful telescopes reveal. Our God as creator is truly remarkable. He put the stars in place and gave names to each one. The heaven of heavens cannot contain Him.

Back to earth, creation not only reveals the greatness of God, creation reveals the will and ways of God. Especially in relation to His Kingdom purposes. Isaiah 9:7 'Of the increase of the government (Kingdom rule) and peace there will be no end....The zeal of the Lord Almighty will accomplish this'. Many of the parables of Jesus speak of the increasing influence of God's Kingdom on earth (yeast, mustard seed, etc). This helps explain why we as a church continue to grow and develop. As a church our heart is to seek first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness. The fruit of this being lived out is that as with creation, then so with His church. His Kingdom purposes will continue to grow and advance.

So, what increase have we witnessed in the last twelve months?

- > We've relaunched our Young Adults ministry, launched a new women's ministry Rooted, and a new men's ministry ManUP! All thanks to Donna in her role.
- We've developed a new service to bless our service users and serve our community 'The Shed Cafe'. We're on the verge of celebrating The Shed's 10th anniversary.
- Our Safe Families Western Isles team have developed into Uist.
- Matthew has transitioned to become Youth Pastor of Martin's Memorial and Youth and Schools Manager of The Shed Project.
- Awakening Youth Conference is going national as we head to Perth. Part of the weekend is going to be launching Awakening Youth Ministries, a new national ministry to connect with and disciple young people throughout Scotland. We're on the verge of having completed plans for The Barn Project A new community space and kitchen to help us serve our community better.
- > I'm now involved in a senior leadership role within the Church of Scotland as we look to God to lead and direct us to a better and brighter future.

It's amazing to reflect on all that God has done and is doing! Returning to the principle I highlighted earlier - just as with creation, God is the initiator of all of the work we are doing. Yes, I'm busy, yes, we're busy as a church, BUT God is the author of the work, and He promises to be faithful and to provide everything we need (body, mind, soul, finance, etc.).

In conclusion, allow me to appeal to a hero of the faith for many of us - William Booth, the founder of the Salvation Army. Born in 1829 and on coming to faith he determined to give the rest of his life and all he had to reaching those in poverty - spiritually, financially, morally, physically and emotionally. He started the work of the Salvation Army in 1865 and gave himself tirelessly to those who were without God and without hope. He gave his last public message on May 9, 1912, when at the age of 83 with rapidly failing health he gave this charge: "While women weep as they do now, I'll fight; while little children go hungry as they do now, I'll fight; while men go to prison, in and out, in and out, as they do now, I'll fight; while there is a drunkard left, while there is a poor lost girl on the streets, while there remains one dark soul without the light of God, I'll fight—I'll fight to the very end!" Three months later on August 20, 1912, "General" William Booth was promoted to eternity.

I know this brings alive the heart you and I have for Christ's work. So, as we reflect on another remarkable year in the life, witness, and work of Martin's Memorial and The Shed Project, allow me to invite you to ask God to say over us again, 'let there be light'. So that our love for God, one another, and our neighbour will grow and expand, and we'll make more space for Christ's Kingdom to come still more.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Review of the year

Weekly offerings from the congregation form the principal source of income. This increased by £370 (2022 -£1,867 decrease) from £137,958 in 2022 to £138,328 in 2023.

Tax recovered on Gift Aid continues to be a vital contribution to income with a total of £49,190 of tax reclaimed in the year, an increase of £8,741 from 2022. The Gift Aid scheme continues to be actively promoted across the congregation.

Other groups and projects continue to be well supported financially by the congregation.

Expenditure in the Unrestricted General Fund increased from £168,513 in 2022 to £193,257 in 2023.

The deficit for the year (after inter-fund transfers) in the Unrestricted General Fund is £1,249 (2022 - £799 surplus).

The accounts show a closing unrestricted reserve balance of £86,094 (2022 - 87,343) as at 31 December 2023.

Fundraising continued for the "Future Projects Fund" during the year, with a cash balance of £375,456 (2022 - £324,114) held at the year end.

#### Reserves policy

It is the Trustees' policy to hold reserves of approximately six months expenditure including designated funds, which would approximate to £70,000 and General Fund balance is in line with this.

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

- > We will progress with our plans for The Barn Project. This ambitious capital project will provide a new community space and a new community kitchen to help us better serve our community.
- > We will consolidate and develop as required our staff team in the church and in The Shed Project. (We currently have 22 staff.)
- Through our Ministry Support Worker, we will develop staff support and staff training for both the church and The Shed.
- We will develop the Awakening Youth Conference from being a local to a national youth event. (First national conference to be held in Perth, March 24.)
- > We will launch Awakening Youth Ministries which will be a national ministry to support, encourage, and disciple young people. It will have a local, regional, and national focus.
- > We will continue to develop ManUP men's ministry with the launch of prayer triplets to encourage growth, relationally and spiritually.
- > We will develop Rooted Women's Ministry and look at the possibility of running a women's conference.
- > We will continue to review and reflect on our outreach as a church and consider the relaunch of our Street Outreach.
- > We will continue to support the development and growth of Safe Families Western Isles and will aim to develop the service into the Uists and Barra.
- > We will support our Intergenerational Work and in partnership with the local authority will consider ongoing growth and development of the service.
- > We will aim to provide another conference day to support and encourage our Office Bearers.
- > We will continue to work in partnership with CNES and NHS Western Isles and other agencies so we can look at ways of better serving our community.
- > We will continue to support and resource as required our minister as he serves our national church through his role as Convener of the Faith Action Programme Leadership Team.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

The Congregation has a Kirk Session and Deacons' Court which operates in terms of the practice and usage of the former United Free Church of Scotland as carried forward into the law and practice of the Church of Scotland, as a result of the union of the United Free Church of Scotland and the Church of Scotland in 1929.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Recruitment and Appointment of Trustees and Organisational Structure

Members of the Kirk Session and the Deacons' Court are the charity trustees.

The Kirk Session members are the elders of the church and are chosen from those members of the church who are considered to have the appropriate gifts and skills. The minister, who is a member of the Kirk Session, is elected by the congregation and inducted by Presbytery. The Kirk Session, which meets approximately six times a year, is responsible for the spiritual affairs within the church.

The Deacons' Court is composed of the Minister and all Elders together with Deacons elected by, and from communicant members of the congregation, appointed for life and ordained by the Kirk Session as regulated by Act X, 1932. Their number is determined by the Kirk Session and the Court meets approximately eight times in a year. The Minister presides when present but the Court chooses one of its own number to preside if the Minister is absent. The Chairman has a casting vote only, may not move motions, but may introduce business and speak to it. The Court elects a Clerk and a Treasurer from its own members. Certain responsibilities are delegated to the Finance Committee and the Fabric Committee as appropriate.

The Court is answerable to Presbytery for censurable or illegal actions.

#### Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The trustees also have a responsibility for ensuring that Church and Manse are fit for purpose and present no danger to the health and safety of office-bearers, worshippers and casual visitors.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2023

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

#### Tangible fixed assets

The charity has the right to occupy and use for its charitable objects certain tangible fixed assets, including the church, halls and manse, vested in the local trustees, who are the Minister and members of the Deacons' Court. No consideration is payable for the use of these assets. Expenditure incurred on the repair and maintenance of these assets is charged as resources expended in the Statement of Financial Activities in the period in which the liability arises.

All tangible fixed assets costing in excess of £1,000 having a value to the greater than one year, other than those acquired for a specific purpose, are capitalised. Depreciation is provided on a straight line basis to write off the cost or initial value, less residual value, of tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives:

Freehold buildings - n/a
Fixtures, fittings and office equipment - 3 or 4 years, on cost
Motor vehicles - n/a

#### **Taxation**

The charity is recognised as a charity for the purposes of applicable taxation and is therefore exempt from tax on its charitable activities. The charity is not registered for VAT and resources expended therefore include irrecoverable input VAT.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

#### Notes to the Financial Statements - continued for the Year Ended 31 December 2023

#### 1. **ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued**

#### Fund accounting

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Endowment funds are funds which have been given on the condition that the original capital sum is not reduced, but the income therefrom is used for the purpose defined in accordance with the objects of the charity.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at market value at the balance sheet date. Unrealised gains and losses represent the difference between the market value at the beginning and end of the financial year, or if purchased in the year, the difference between the cost and market value at the end of the year. Realised gains and losses represent the difference between the proceeds on disposal and the market value at the start of the year or cost if purchased in the year.

# Church of Scotland stipend policy

All Church of Scotland congregations contribute to the National Stipend Fund which bears the costs of all ministers' stipends and employers' contributions for national insurance, pension and housing and loan fund. Ministers' stipends are paid in accordance with the national stipend scale, which is related to years of service. For the year under review the minimum stipend was £30,135 (2022 - £28,700) and the maximum stipend in 5th and subsequent years of service was £37,032 (2022 - £35,269).

#### Purpose of funds:

Unrestricted General Fund - to fund regular church activities.

Unrestricted Guild Fund - to fund regular Guild activities and to fund donations to good causes.

Restricted General Fund - to fund specific project costs through collections. The resulting donations to the third parties are often 'rounded up' by a transfer from the Unrestricted General Fund.

Restricted Children & Youth Work Fund - to fund specific project costs, including expenditure funded by restricted grant income.

Restricted Future Projects Fund - (previously called Renovation Project Fund) - to fund the refurbishment and development of the church buildings.

Restricted Shed Project Fund - to fund refurbishment of the additional church building and also to fund revenue costs such as the Shed Project Worker. The cash reserves of this fund were transferred to a new charity set up specifically for this work, on 29 October 2021.

Restricted Manse Project Fund - to make provision for the improvement and development of the manse.

Restricted Prayer Meeting Fund - to fund donations to local, national and international good causes. Offcrings given throughout the year are disbursed before the year-end following discussion with those who attend the prayer meeting.

Jane Cook Mackenzie Memorial Endowment Fund - to provide grants to the poor of the parish.
