## Achievements and performance

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the financial period

We have actively engaged more community members who are supporting TALC, and bringing new and varied activities to the spaces we provide. To make our space more user friendly, and to ensure that TALC continues to be seen as an accessible space at the heart of the community, we have trialled and instituted an online booking system. This has been well received, and has provided much needed transparency for the committee to see when the building is in use, and for members of the community to see when a room is available to hire.

We have started to improve the fabric of the building, to create more beautiful and useful spaces for our building users, and to improve energy efficiency. Community consultation has been an important part of the planned improvements. Ground floor improvements have seen new hirers offering fitness classes, and we have also been able to offer new weekly Mindfulness and Tai Chi sessions with volunteer facilitators, with funding from the Argyll & Bute Council Supporting Communities fund.

The creative arts programme - Youth Arts Argyll - has continued with its

The creative arts programme - Youth Arts Argyll - has continued with its excellent work, offering:

Experimentation Days throughout the year for young people who wish to prepare their portfolio to apply for art school; a series of ceramics workshops at TALC for children aged 10+, providing a valuable opportunity for local children to work creatively in 3D - the only creative arts class available to children locally; dance & wellbeing classes for young people aged 11-18, combining intense physical exercise with creativity, expression, timing and musicality - again, this is the only dance or fitness class available locally specifically for young people; Art Days for home educated children; and collaborating with schools, organisations and arts centres, both locally and further afield, to provide arts opportunities for members of our community, and young people across Argyll.

## **Annual Report for 2023**

The last 12 months have been very positive for TALC. Our committee have worked well together to create change with both immediate impact and forward looking plans, volunteering their time and energy to make lasting improvements to the fabric and management of the TALC building, and to develop TALC as a vital community resource.

Following a deficit of £2,227 in the 2022 financial year, the Trustees decided in January 2023 to raise the room rental for businesses to from £10 to £15 per hour commencing 1<sup>st</sup> February. Room fees for community groups were raised to £8.00 per hour across the board as of 1<sup>st</sup> August 2023. The Community Council, Community Trust and Lodge Tarbert fees were retained at £10 per hour. Due to changes in the booking secretaries' circumstances, the treasurer took over the task of issuing invoices and successfully managed to chase all outstanding monies owed during the year.

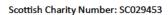
A Coffee Morning held in June raised £357.82, as well as a further £50 donation each from the Friendship Group and Tarbert Harbour Authority.

We received a grant of £2,500 from Argyll and Bute Council in June 2023. As of 31 December, £1,025 of this was spent to pay for dance class tuition, and room rental for both the dance class and and a new beginner's Tai Chi class, as well as an admin fee to Stefan Baumberger from Youth Arts Argyll for administering the project. The Tai Chi class ran between Sept and Dec. All those attending the Tai Chi class insisted on paying a contribution, and as a result, the Trust received £127.00 in donations. All the Tai Chi participants decided they wished to continue the class, and so that group has become another regular hall user.

The Trustees set up a reserves policy in September, designating money for a projected overspend of £3,000 for 2023 and £6,000 for 2024, a contingency fund of £10,000 and £5,000 for match funding, as well as all the money from general donations for improvements of the ground floor. The overspends were projected due to a new electricity contract which started in October 2023 at double the cost of the previous one which had been signed in 2019.

A donation of £1,000 was given to the Trust in November 2023 towards the maintenance and running costs of the hall by Lodge Tarbert, who was celebrating its 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary.

We ended 2023 with a small deficit of minus £162. However, we had an overcharge of £1,500 from our electricity company which we were unable to get refunded before





the end of the financial year; if it had not been for that, we would not have been in the red.

We did not need to use the £3,000 we put aside for an overspend in 2023. The number of bookings has increased as people seemed to have gained their confidence about going out to activities post pandemic. We continue to need to be careful of our money, and to reduce our electricity costs in particular, but things are looking much more positive than they were a year ago.

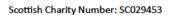
To make our space more user friendly, and to ensure that TALC continues to be seen as an accessible space at the heart of the community, we have investigated and intend to start to trial an online booking system. Discussions with the manager of another hall using the system indicated advantages to members of the community being able to see when a room is available to hire.

We have started to improve the fabric of the building, to create more beautiful and useful spaces for our building users, and to improve energy efficiency. Community consultation has been an important part of the planned improvements. The challenges of finding builders to do the required work continues, but we have made a start by booking floor refurbishment for the ground floor room and sourcing privacy blinds which will make the space more welcoming for a range of activities. We also plan a project to replace all the lighting in the building with LEDs, cutting our energy use and costs.

With a view to further improving energy efficiency in the building, and to reduce our considerable running costs, we worked with Business Energy Scotland (BES) to conduct a review of the building, and a report was produced to give guidance on the changes that we will need to make. We weren't entirely happy with the BES report which was produced without a site visit due to our location, and which didn't give enough thought to the intermittent usage pattern of the building. Improving the heating, lighting and hot water provision in the building is a priority for the next 12 months, to both save energy usage and costs, and to provide warm and comfortable spaces for building users.

The creative arts programme led by responsible for Youth Arts Argyll has continued with its excellent work, despite sector wide funding challenges. Fortunately, are skilled at identifying and applying for funding to ensure that their important work can continue. Over the past 12 months, the programme has provided a range of opportunities for young people across Argyll to explore and engage with the arts:

 Experimentation Days are held throughout the year at TALC and at the Rockfield Centre in Oban for those who wish to prepare their portfolio to apply for art school, with opportunities to discuss course choices, sketchbook development, planning for portfolio sheets, exploration of sources of





inspiration (artists and their artworks, books, natural, built and social environment), an introduction to Adobe Illustrator, paper cuts/laser cut, experimenting with printing techniques, ceramics, metal work and jewellery making.

- Working with ceramicist
   Workshops at TALC for children aged 10+. This provided a valuable opportunity for local children to work creatively in 3D and is the only creative arts class available to children locally.
- This year YAA @ TALC have continued to deliver dance & wellbeing workshops for young people aged 11-18. Classes led by combine intense physical exercise with creativity, expression, timing and musicality. Again, this is the only dance or fitness class available locally for young people.
- This year YAA @ TALC offered Art Days for home educated children and young people for the first time. During these full day workshops, home educated children explored creative expression, several arts & crafts techniques and environmental awareness.
- In collaboration with Tarbert Academy Art teacher
   historian
   and Tarbert and Skipness Community Trust, YAA @
   TALC worked with S1 -S3 art students who created embroidered historical photographs of Tarbert, which were displayed in the display case at TALC, and received a great deal of local interest and appreciation.
- YAA supported TALC to deliver a series of wellbeing workshops, funded by Argyll & Bute Council's Supporting Communities fund. This project has made it possible for local people to try wellness activities such as Tai Chi and Mindfulness for the first time.

It's clear to see how important the collaboration between the Templar Arts & Leisure Centre Trust and Youth Arts Argyll is to our role in the community.

Looking forward to the year ahead, our goal is clear – to move forward with the positive momentum built over the last 12 months, to ensure that the crucial building developments continue, and to ensure that TALC provides affordable, welcoming spaces in which every member of our community can meet, learn, and grow.

We are developing a successful strategy based on prioritising community focused arts and wellbeing, supported by revenue driven room hire. Grant funding will continue to be key to our viability, and we will need to carefully evaluate and plan building developments to steadily reduce energy costs and increase our sustainability.





We are gradually extending our network and building a community of people who want to help maintain and support this important community space, and creating a wider and deeper network should be a priority for the next 12 months.

Finally, it is really important to once again acknowledge the time, energy and commitment of our Trustees and Lead Artists. We are a small committee, with limited time and resources, and it would be all too easy for the trustees to walk away from TALC and focus on their own lives. The fact that we come together to manage, maintain and improve this building, volunteering our spare time and energy to keep alive a community space at the heart of our village, is really amazing. Community spaces play a crucial role in providing residents with a sense of belonging and identity. They offer a place for people to connect, socialise and engage in creative and wellness activities, fostering a sense of community spirit and shared purpose – this is the gift that the trustees give to their community along with their time.
