Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 30th March 2025

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30th March 2025. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS I 02) (effective I January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The organisation is established for charitable purposes only, and in particular, the object is to advance and support the teaching and training of psychiatry to healthcare professionals in Malawi.

The area within which the organisation shall operate (in this constitution referred to as the 'Area of Benefit') shall be the whole of Malawi including, but not restricted to, Zomba Mental Hospital and the College of Medicine in Blantyre, and the whole of Zambia including but not restricted to the University of Zambia School of Medicine.

The organisation shall promote (but not promote exclusively) its activities and delivery operations to people within the 'Area of Benefit' who are psychiatrists, MMed (psychiatry) trainees, medical and nursing students, healthcare professionals, and other groups with an interest in mental health. These people will be the organisation's beneficiaries.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

SMMHEP's assistance of medical student teaching in Malawi, by recruiting and supporting short-term volunteer psychiatrists, continued through the reporting period. In addition, we appointed of a longer term psychiatrist for 10 months, from August 2023 to focus on the training needs of the postgraduate trainees. This post is supported by a bursary. It involves both direct teaching and helping the Head of Department at Kamuzu University of Health Sciences (KUHeS) with developmental and teaching tasks.

As a result of SMMHEP's training work in Malawi, from 2024 there will be enough local mental health expertise to run the undergraduate teaching programme. SMMHEP's emphasis will therefore be on supporting further postgraduate training to meet the service needs of the country.

Accordingly, there will no longer be a need for a short-term volunteer psychiatrists programme to teach undergraduates. This part of the programme came to an end in December 2024. The long-term plan is to appoint two bursaried visiting psychiatrists to support postgraduate training. We were unable to appoint a bursaried psychiatrist following the departure of the ten-month position in June 2024 but were fortunate in having a psychiatrist from Holland who stepped in to support the programme. She received some expenses but not a bursary. She left in November 2024. Once our interim funding was secured through a grant of £39,560 in September 2024 from the Scottish Government, we have had two bursaried visiting psychiatrists in place since January 2025 although one began her role in October 2024.

The MMed training programme is ongoing. Two Scottish Government -funded MMed trainees sat their final exams in September 2024. One passed one failed (which was his final attempt). A further seven trainees are currently undergoing post graduate training, paid for by the University of North Carolina and the Malawi Ministry of Health and using the model established by SMMHEP. SMMI-IEP continues to provide postgraduate training support via KUHeS for all these trainees as well as the two Scottish Government funded ones.

A review of the postgraduate curriculum has been initiated, completed in 2024. Thee-learning resources available to undergraduates on the MB BS and MMed courses have been substantially revised and now cover all parts of the curriculum. E-learning resources are standardized for use in Zambia and Malawi.

A Quality Improvement project to improve training in risk assessment and management of mentally ill patients was started in September 2023 As part of this project, clinical staff from Zomba Mental Hospital visited the Blair Unit Cornhill Hospital Aberdeen and staff from that Unit then visited Zomba Mental Hospital in October 2023 and April 2024, respectively. This project reported in September 2024. There have been changes in the care processes in Zomba Hospital as a result and we are hopeful for further visits from the Blair Unit.

The University of Edinburgh, together with KUHeS, has received funding from the Welcome Trust for a large research project to improve the identification and treatment of major mental illness in Malawi. Two of SMMI-IEP's trustees are investigators in this project.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Major Funding

SMMHEP was funded by two grants from the Scottish Government International Development Fund. The Scotland-Malawi Psychiatry Capacity Development Project (SMPCDP) 2016-2024 awarded in March 2016 with a SMMHEP Trustee, as the Principal Investigator, supported scholarships for up to four Malawian MBBS graduates to study for the MMed (Psychiatry) qualification. Graduates on this training programme received full funding to cover tuition fees and living expenses to allow them to take the necessary four years of study in Blantyre and Cape Town. A second grant, Consolidating Psychiatry Capacity DeYelopment in Malawi and Zambia (CPMZ) 2018 - 2021, has now come to an end. It funded a collaboration between the Colleges of Medicine in Malawi and Zambia which supported:

(!) Undergraduate teaching at the Malawi College of Medicine, supporting both long- and short-term volunteer psychiatrists to stay in Malawi and teach on the undergraduate and postgraduate psychiatry teaching programmes.

(2) Work to standardize e-learning materials for use in Zambia and Malawi.

(3) Quality Improvement work to strengthen the training environments for psychiatrists and other mental health workers in Malawi and Zambia.

In May 2021, in response to the Covid-19 situation, the charity discussed changes to the grants with the Scottish Government International Development Team. It was agreed to consolidate the CPMZ grant into the SMPCDP grant into a single grant to: Continue to support undergraduate teaching and extend the contract of a course administrator based in the College of Medicine and continue a Quality Improvement project in Malawi and Zambia until October 2022.

The Scottish Government agreed an extension of the SMPCDP grant to allow continuation of activity (I) above until end September 2024. In addition, this grant funded a bursary for a lecturer from the UK to work in KUI--leS to support the postgraduate training programme and fund further QI work in Zomba Mental Hospital and Queen Elizabeth Central I--lospital, Blantyre to train staff in special aspects of clinical assessment and management. At the end of this grant (September 2024) the Scottish Government gave an interim grant (£39,560) to keep the project going until the new Scottish Government funding system (the Health Partnership Programme) became active and new funds could be applied for.

Other Activities

A "Just Giving" appeal at the start of the Covid-19 crisis raised £5687 for resources to benefit patients and staff in Zomba Mental I--lospital.

Safeguarding Policy

SMMHEP has adopted a set of procedures for safeguarding the adults and children with whom it works. These procedures have been designed to ensure the welfare and protection of any adult or child who accesses services provided by SMMHEP. The procedures recognise that adult or child abuse can be a difficult subject for workers to deal with. SMMHEP is committed to the belief that the protection of vulnerable adults or children from harm and abuse is everybody's responsibility and the aim of these procedures is to ensure that all trustees of the organisation and volunteers act appropriately in response to any concern around adult or child abuse. The procedures SMMI--IEP has adopted address the following: preventing of abuse; recognising the signs and symptoms of abuse; responding to people who have experienced or are expecting to experience abuse; managing allegations made against a member of staff or a volunteer; recording and managing confidential information; disseminating and reviewing policy and procedures.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

The trustees are satisfied with the financial position of the SCIO. They also note the SCIO owns the following equipment, kept in Malawi:

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Principal funding sources

The original grants totalling £474,449 awarded by the Scottish Government Malawi Development Fund towards the development of psychiatry capacity in Malawi was supplemented by a further grant of £103,875 paid in two installments in July and October 2023. A further interim payment of £39,560 was paid in this reporting period in September 2024 to tide SMMHEP over until new funding application processes were in place from the Scottish Government Health Partnership Programme. As of May 2025, these arrangements are yet to be finalised.

Reserves policy

Plans for spending the SMPCDP grants are already agreed with the Scottish Government. The trustees will decide on the plans for the unrestricted funds throughout the coming year.

The project is very grateful for the support of the following:

- The Scottish Government Malawi Development Fund has provided the main funding for the project's activities.
- The Royal College of Psychiatrists supports the project as a suitable postgraduate training
- experience for senior trainee psychiatrists and

network for raising the profile of the project, especially important for volunteer recruitment.

- Postgraduate deans in the West and South East of Scotland, Tayside and Aberdeen, have all given support for volunteer trainee psychiatrists participating in the undergraduate teaching project.

- NHS Education Scotland has also supported the project as a suitable postgraduate training experience.

- NHS Education Scotland have also provided training in QI principles and practice free of charge.

- We are grateful for the individual and smaller institutional financial donations received, donations of equipment and to the volunteers for their time and expertise.

We are grateful to the KUHeS in Blantyre and the mental health professionals in Malawi for their continuing approval and support for the volunteer psychiatrists. In particular, we are grateful in KUI-IeS, and the psychiatrist in charge of Zomba Mental Hospital, for providing clear guidance and support for the Project.

FUTURE PLANS

Our priority is to ensure that MMed Psychiatry trainees will receive support throughout their remaining time in Malawi and South Africa. We will apply for funding from Scottish Government international development sources as and when these become available. On this basis SMMHEP will continue to arrange input to postgraduate training programmes by bursaried psychiatrists from UK and other countries. In discussion with Malawi partners, we will consider how to use new funds for training further postgraduates in Malawi and for building up the training infrastructure in KUHes. We plan to continue the Quality Improvement programme to address issues of clinical assessment and management, particularly in Zomba Mental Hospital.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a Constitution, and constitutes a Scottish Charitable Incorporated Organisation (SCIO).

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Charity trusteeship is open to any person considered by the Board to be suitably qualified, any individual nominated by an unincorporated organisation and / or any corporate body who subscribes to the purposes of the organisation and wishes to see them fulfilled.

Any person who wishes to become a trustee must sign a written application to be considered by the Board at its next meeting. The Board may at its discretion refuse to admit any person, nominated individual or corporate body to charity trusteeship and must notify each applicant promptly.

The constitution requires that the number of Charity Trustees should not be less than three nor more than fifteen. At each AGM one third of the charity trustees (to the nearest whole number) must retire but are eligible to stand for re-election.

<u>Notes to the Financial Statements</u> for the <u>Year Ended 30th March 2025</u>

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities and Trustee Investment (Scotland) Act 2005. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Financial instruments

Cash and bank

Cash and bank comprises cash on hand and call deposits, and other short term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

Trade creditors

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers.

Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the company does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date they are presented as non current liabilities.

2. TRUSTEES' REMUNERATION AND BENEFITS

During the year, one trustee of the SCIO, Dr J Ahrens, was entitled to a bursary of£7,470 for educational development. This was approved by the Board at a meeting on the 9th of September, 2024. No payment was made for her services as a Trustee and the cost is accounted for as Consultancy fees.

Trustees' expenses

There were no trustees' expenses paid for the year ended 30th March 2025 nor for the year ended 30th March 2024.

During the year under review, the following trustees received refunds towards airfares and in country running expenses: £2,500, £3,528 and £1,378.
