
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COVID-19 continues to affect charities and those they support

70% of charities have seen a negative impact on those they support as a result of COVID-19, according to a recent survey by the Scottish Charity Regulator (OSCR).



Over 2,500 charities

responded to the survey to help provide a snapshot of the impact of the pandemic on a large and representative cross section of Scottish charities. Carried out in November 2020, it builds on the comprehensive data gathered from OSCR's first COVID-19 charity survey in May.

Does your governing document allow virtual meetings?



Throughout the pandemic, one of the ongoing challenges for charity trustees has been how they can govern their charities well despite not being able to get together face-to-face around the board table.

OSCR has been actively encouraging charities to look at the best possible way of having good meetings. What we have seen during the COVID-19 restrictions is that many organisations have embraced new ways of doing things, with many trustees getting more and more comfortable with using the online space to have meetings and make decisions. However, one of the difficulties has been that the governing documents of some charities do not permit an online approach.

SCIO legislation

On 30 September 2020, the Corporate Insolvency and **Governance Act 2020 (Meetings of Scottish Charitable** Incorporated Organisations) (Coronavirus) (No. 2) Regulations 2020 (legislation.gov.uk) made legal provision for SCIOs to be able to hold member's meetings using 'virtual' methods whether or not governing documents permit this. These provisions have now been extended until the 30 March 2021. This is likely to be the last extension to these provisions, and so it is very important to make sure that your charity is 'future proofed' in terms of being able to conduct meetings virtually by allowing them in your governing document.

Making changes

If you are going to need to alter your governing document to allow for virtual meetings, then now is the time to make the relevant changes.

It doesn't matter whether your charity is a company, a SCIO, an unincorporated organisation or anything else. Having the 'virtual' provision there can only be a good thing in terms of the resilience of your charity going forwards.

To do this, make the appropriate changes in your governing document and then let us know within 3 months that you have done so. There is information on **our website** and a short form to fill in when you are notifying us about the change. You can find that form **here**.

If you are a charity trustee, you might be involved in discussions about possibly using reserves to support the work of the charity at this tricky time.

Applying to dissolve a solvent SCIO – top tips to get it right



In supporting charities to have good governance and get things right first time, we have recently noticed a small number of common issues with applications from SCIOs that are solvent but want to dissolve.

We have turned these issues into four top tips to help charity trustees of SCIOs in this situation to follow the correct processes and provide us with the correct information first time so that we can deal with the application as efficiently as possible.

Here are the 4 top tips:

- 1. Understand what the charitable purposes of your SCIO are as set out in your governing document this will help you to select an appropriate recipient for the remaining funds your SCIO has.
- Remember to name a recipient body on your application even where there are little or no assets to distribute. This is a legal requirement and we cannot process your application without this information.
- 3. Make sure the charitable purposes that the recipient body has in its governing document are the same as or closely resemble the ones your SCIO has in its governing document. Please note that it is not appropriate for your local Third Sector Interface (TSI) to be the named recipient.
- Once you have passed the necessary resolution to dissolve, send the <u>completed application</u> to OSCR within 21 days of the resolution date. This is a legal requirement and we cannot process your application if we receive it after the 21 days has passed.

Strengthening Scottish Charity Law survey

Following on from the charity law consultation in 2019 which sought views on potential improvements to the charity regulation framework in Scotland, the Scottish Government have launched a survey to develop and refine the proposals.



This will provide stakeholders with an opportunity to help Scottish Government formulate a position on the way forward with charity law. They want to hear from people working in and with the charity sector, members of the public, and anyone with an interest in charity law. The survey is live now and will run until 19 February 2021.

If your charity has to also submit an annual return to the Care Inspectorate, they have revised the deadline for submitting until Sunday 28 March.

The Care Inspectorate will review this revised deadline at the start of March to consider if a further extension may be necessary for all or some services.

Revitalising trusts for public benefit

OSCR and Foundation
Scotland have revealed they
are preparing to launch a
brand new project which
could unlock additional
funding for charities and
other community and
voluntary groups across
Scotland.



The Revitalising Trusts project aims to identify charitable trusts registered in Scotland that appear to be inactive and support them to reactivate by using funds that are lying dormant. Charitable trusts typically provide public benefit by making grants or donations to other charities, voluntary groups or individuals. So-called 'sleepy trusts' are identified as charities that have either had no income or expenditure over the last 5 years or have donated less than 30% of their total income over the last 5 years to help good causes. The project will also look at charitable trusts that have failed to submit annual accounts and reports to OSCR within the last 5 years.
